N2N COMMITTEE MINUTES

Time and Place: Friday, March 18, 2016 @ 7:45 a.m. City Hall Boardroom

1) Approval of Minutes

A motion was made by Radtke and seconded by Herring to approve the 02/19/16 minutes. The Motion carried unanimously and the minutes will be placed on file.

2) Clean It Up, Wausau Discussion

Communication was emailed to the committee members earlier regarding the fees that 5R Processors are charging to take the electronics at this year's event. The Committee decided to decline the contract with 5R Processors and reach out to the Good News Project again. DPW Supervisor Mohelnitzky spoke with the Director of the Good News Project this week and they agreed to participate with some assistance they would need from DPW. Details were worked out and the Good News Project will participate at the event and charge \$.40/per lbs for electronics. They are going to need volunteers to assist. Groeschel will draft a sign-up sheet and distribute to solicit volunteers. Since this Clean Up event is scheduled at the same time the committee would regularly hold their next meeting, the April 15th meeting will be cancelled.

3) Neighborhood Updates

Riverview Neighborhood - They had a good meeting last night. Dave DeSantis provided fire safety information to the group. A Police Officer was there who spoke about the RAIDSONLINE program. They discussed helping neighbors within their Neighborhood get items to the Yard Waste on the Clean It up days.

Forest Park Neighborhood - Jeff Traska was at their last meeting to talk about black bears within our community. Mayoral Candidates Jay Kronenwetter and David Oberbeck were there. They continue to get complaints regarding the garbage carriers who dump the containers too fast on collection day and ultimately garbage is spilling into the roadway. Tentatively they have a Picnic Date set up for Tuesday, September 20, 2016. They'd like to try and get Sylvan Hill without paying a fee for its use. Mayor will contact Bill Duncanson regarding this.

East Towne Neighborhood - Meetings are going well. Some residents within their neighborhood group are still unhappy with the elimination of Large-Item curbside pick-up.

South East Side Neighborhood - Firefighter Ambrosia offered to provide a report to the group from the fire safety angle. He's going to provide CPR training to the group in the future. The neighborhood will hold their 2nd annual Garden Walk on July 24, 2016.

4) Old/New Business

DPW Supervisor Mohelnitzky spoke to the committee about the positive reasons for eliminating the curbside pick-up. Beside the tremendous cost savings to the city, we are ultimately saving our roadways from the abuse our local roads received from the large equipment used for the curbside pick-up, among many other things.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Radtke and seconded by Holster. Meeting adjourned at 8:30 a.m.

2.60.250 Legislative committee. The committee shall consist of three alderpersons and two citizen members who routinely review proposed legislative action on state and federal levels to study the legislation's benefits and/or detriments and recommend an official city response to governmental representatives. In addition, the committee shall be instrumental in coordinating the efforts of city staff to initiate, create or lobby for legislation beneficial to the city and/or its residents. (Ord. 61-5204 §2, 2003, File No. 03-0522.)

2.60.260 Neighbor to neighbor committee. (a) Scope. A nonstanding citizen committee that reports to the mayor's office. The committee's purpose is to empower citizen neighborhood associations. The city of Wausau will offer and make available tactical support and informational resources to assist the committee in achieving its goals.

(b) Membership.

(1) Nine voting members to be appointed by the mayor, each to a two-year term, running concurrent with the terms of common council members. A committee chairperson shall be appointed by the mayor and the nine appointed members are to be approved by the common council.

(c) Meetings. To be held twice a month.

(d) Goals.

(1) To act as a clearinghouse for information.

(2) To address the issue of neighborhood security.

(3) To address the issue of compliance with city ordinances by property owners.

(4) To provide recommendations to the mayor's office and common council regarding the aforementioned issues.

(5) To encourage communication and coordination between groups that have an interest in the aforementioned issues.

(6) To promote the growth and success of citizen neighborhood associations within the city of Wausau.

(e) Challenges and recommended actions.

(1) To establish more citizen neighborhood associations within the city of Wausau.

(2) To explore the feasibility of defining and establishing a volunteer group to assist law enforcement and inspections personnel with their duties.

- (3) To define a formula/template for the purpose of funding citizen neighborhood association activities and projects with private sector monies.
 - (4) To promote a sense of community responsibility within neighborhoods.
 - (5) To engage nonprofit participation in meeting neighbor goals.
- (f) Features.
- (1) Provides city-wide program and representation.
 - (2) Has clear objectives and builds on already successful, proven neighborhood initiatives.
 - (3) Focuses on problems identified by neighborhood associations; neighborhood security, and compliance with city ordinances in regard to quality of life issues.
 - (4) Avoids duplication of social services already offered by other government agencies.
 - (5) Empowers individual citizens and promotes volunteerism.



Close knit communities have less crime, fewer instances of vandalism and are generally happier places to live. By starting a neighborhood group, you can bring neighbors closer together and improve the state of your community. Starting a neighborhood group is easier than you may think. All you need is some flyers, a place to meet and the right attitude.

A neighborhood group determines its own activities based on its needs. If you are really ambitious, you could even start a neighborhood newsletter. It is community efforts like these that help neighborhoods grow closer and give each other the support system that is so important—especially during tough times. There is a comfort in knowing who your neighbors are, knowing that they will be there for you during difficult medical or financial times or even just when you need a friendly shoulder to lean on or a cup of sugar.

The first step to starting a neighborhood group is deciding on a place to meet. Usually a school or community building will let you use space for free. You could even use a room in your house if it is large enough to hold a moderate-size group of people.
