CITY OF WAUSAU – PARK AND RECREATION COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Date/Time: December 7, 2015 at 5:15pm Location: Board Room, City Hall

In accordance with Chapter 19, Wisc. Statutes, notice of this meeting was posted and sent to the Daily Herald in the proper manner. It was noted that there was a quorum present and the meeting was called to order by Oberbeck at 5:15pm.

Public comments – none brought forward

Approval of Minutes – **Motion** by Mielke, second by Neal to approve the Park and Recreation Committee November 2nd, 2015 draft minutes. Motion **carried** by voice vote. Vote reflected as 5-0.

East Riverfront Redevelopment Parkland - Discussion and Possible Action on Contracting Park Design Services – Duncanson said east riverfront work already under construction to be completed in 2016 includes 2nd Avenue, Stinchfield Creek, and some parking lots. Portions that are going to be ready to go out to bid for construction in 2016 include the riverbank work, the Rivers Edge Trail, Stinchfield Creek landscaping, and trail work from First to Third Street along the railroad tracks. This leaves the property north of the WOW building which is slated to be park land needing to be designed. Stantec has done all of the design work on the features on the trail including the Sternberg Plaza, pedestrian bridge, wharf area, Adirondack area, walkways, seating facilities, etc. Over the last couple weeks benefactors in the community have noted how nice those designs look and want to share in the costs of some of those facilities. There may be more benefactor support than there are currently designed facilities. In order to optimize donated funding staff felt it would be beneficial to complete design work and associated cost estimates on the park area and associated facilities including the proposed restroom. Accordingly, staff requested Stantec to prepare design proposals which resulted in Task Order 9 for the restroom and Task Order 10 for the park area being drafted by Stantec. Staff reviewed the task orders and discussed the most advantageous way to deal with the scope of work and fee structure because at this time both task orders cover conceptual and preliminary design but not final design. Staff is asking Committee to consider giving staff permission to work with Stantec to refine these two task orders by revising the design process and associated fee structures that would be in best interest of the City. He said this is essentially an extension on Stantec’s existing contract. Staff would like to stay with Stantec for many reasons including staying on current construction timelines with the project and not having to start from scratch going out with a request for proposals for design services. If they stay with Stantec it would save time, coordination during design, and it would especially save coordination during construction because they wouldn’t have two project managers from two different design firms and potentially different contractors working right next to each other in this limited space.

Neal said at the most recent Economic Development Committee meeting they had a resolution to accept Stantec as sole source provider for this same stretch of property and amenities. He dissented mainly because there was no dollar figure assigned to it and he wanted to see if there was any potential for competitive bidding. The City is looking at design services but does that then lead right into general contracting construction services? Groat gave history that back in 2012 the City did go through a competitive process to select Stantec and as part of that process the City explained to the various contractors that they were interested in retaining the services of one full service consulting firm that would be able to help the City through the entire process of redeveloping that area understanding that there would be a lot of institutional knowledge gained during the phased projects that they wouldn’t want someone else to have to relearn. The City received six proposals and Stantec was awarded the contract. Stantec has done the market study, all the remediation planning work, and planned for street construction so there is quite a bit of knowledge Stantec has secured. The final piece is the bank remediation to the south which is scheduled. So again, that would be an area that the City thinks Stantec would be the appropriate consultant because of all the experience and knowledge they have gained. Neal questioned how that applied to the park land

to the north. Groat explained that Foundations were interested in donating because of the designs and they are very enthusiastic and are interested in seeing results sooner rather than later. Lenz noted that part of the experience with Stantec has been with public involvement. They had an open house for the public and they had a website where thousands of people visited and left comments. They have been taking this community's input from two years ago all the way up to the present. Gisselman questioned why this is needed to be approved when he thought Stantec had been awarded the project. Groat said staff is trying to be transparent. When First Street was added staff brought that to CISM and Finance Committees. Duncanson said that part of the reason this item is here is because some of the redevelopment area is slated to be park land and they wanted the Park and Recreation Committee to have some of the same discussions as the Economic Development Committee. Nutting agreed there had been excellent involvement by the community all along and he has been pleased with Stantec's work. Duncanson said that Stantec had listed an entire range of possibilities of what conceptually could happen in the area and that whole range is not going to happen. There was an idea to have a restroom that would have service space to store materials. There is a question if they should add small concessions or possibly an open picnic wing. That grows and expands the original concept and is part of the reason staff believes they need to have flexibility in the scope of how fees are determined. They don't know what the final size of the restroom/storage/concession/open wing will be. Oberbeck asked if there was a concept number as far as the overall budget. Duncanson said the maximum cost may be what they believe they can afford to maintain based on what gets donated. Neal said the main thing is to develop further refined designs, down to specifics which can be used for fundraising purposes to see how far it can go. Oberbeck said what they are really asking Stantec for is development of a masterplan in which things can be plugged in as funds become available. Neal said he was not against any of this and the master agreement pre-dates him. He didn't recall discussing design services for the bridge, lights, patio, etc., so he was wondering how this got pulled out. Groat thought they did come back to Finance Committee and Common Council on a couple occasions' expansions of the contract allowing them to go to the next phase with Stantec. **Motion** by Nutting, second Mielke to continue to utilize the services of Stantec as the designer of the park area and bath room area and to direct staff to negotiate favorable terms for the benefit of the City that reflect the possible scope of what the project may end up to be. **Motion carried** by voice vote. Vote reflected as 5-0.

River Edge Trail – Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Grant – Discussion and Possible Action on Applying for a TAP Grant for River Edge Trail Construction Costs – Lenz explained that this is a DOT alternative transportation grant opportunity grant for the City. The DOT has combined different programs that used to be transportation enhancements grants. He said the grant is 80% funded and 20% local. It's for alternative modes of transportation like bikes and sidewalks so the River Edge Trail could be an excellent candidate. There are several segments in the trail that are in the planning stages that could be applied for. Staff will submit the grant to the DOT in January and then come back with a resolution that would show the City's commitment to the 20% funding. That can be done in a couple months once they have more details on the plans and which specific segments they would be applying for. They would like direction from Committee that it's okay to apply for this grant for the River Edge Trail. Duncanson clarified that the trail is a twelve month travel way and this is good timing because these are projects that can occur through 2020. Lenz noted that it is a statewide competition. **Motion** by Mielke, second by Neal to allow staff to move forward with applying for a TAP grant for River Edge Trail construction costs. **Motion carried** by voice vote.

Tree Sensitive Road and Sidewalk Construction – Report on Creating a Seminar on Tree Sensitive Road and Sidewalk Construction – Duncanson said Jim Kringer, the 'tree cop', will be here in March to put on a seminar. Staff wants to invite other municipalities to help influence the local contractors to respond favorably. Oberbeck would like Kringer to take a tour of Wausau and see what is being done now. He wondered if Kringer could do a session with contractors answering their questions about construction techniques at a different time than the government session. Duncanson thought they should invite everyone to the same meeting. Lindman said he will set it up and get a list of people to send an invite to when that will work.

Groat and Lenz left the meeting at 6:00pm

Recreation Program Update – Report on Upcoming Winter Recreation Program Preparations – Duncanson explained that the department does not have very heavy duty snow making equipment at Sylvan Tubing Hill to

make a lot of good snow or many snow piles in advance and move them around. He believes Sylvan Tubing Hill will open a week later than the target date of December 18th unless a lot of natural snow is received. He also explained that at least two inches of packed snow are needed to make the ice rinks. Staff may import some snow from the downtown airport to get the 400 Block ice rink open for the holidays and that may be the only rink open during the holidays unless natural snow is received.

Project Update

Memorial Pool – Pool shell and walls are complete, mechanical equipment installation will continue over the winter and pool finishes will be completed in the spring. The bath house is closed in so that interior work can continue over the winter.

Athletic Park Phase 2 – Bids were received for the bathroom fixture installation. The project was awarded to the low bidder Altmann Construction for \$80,800. This project was stipulated in the development agreement between the City and Wisconsin College Baseball for the Phase 2 project.

Radtke Park Erosion Mitigation – The project was re-bid October 27th. Bid for the re-design came in within budget and the project was awarded to Janke General Contractors for \$155,288.15.

City Outdoor Recreation Plan – Request for Proposals will be published this Sunday and are due January 7th, 2016. The goal is to have the plan so that the department is eligible for grants on May 1, 2016. If this is not possible the DNR has a process whereby the department could receive interim eligibility.

JoJo's Jungle - Hoerter distributed a functional layout with the current recommended playground equipment drawings. He has Little Tykes Commercial developing an actual CAD drawing to get proper dimensions for sidewalks and square footage for surfacing in place and is hoping to have that in a couple weeks. He would like to get line item budget items to go after big donors with within a couple months so that they are no more than a year out from when they anticipate being ready to construct. He noted there are a lot of grants that are one year time limited.






KEYED NOTES

- DIAGONAL ASPHALT PATHWAYS THROUGH THE PARK WILL REPRESENT "RUNWAYS". THESE PATHWAYS WILL HAVE RUNWAY LIGHTS AND MARKINGS INCLUDING: WHITE CENTER LINES, YELLOW EDGE LINES, MAGNETIC HEADINGS, ALL DONE PER SCALED FAA SPECIFICATIONS. "LIGHTING" CAN BE SIMULATED USING THE SAME SURFACES REFLECTORS USED ON STREETS AND HIGHWAYS. THE "LIGHTS" WILL BE COLORED THE SAME AS RUNWAY LIGHTS: "EDGE LIGHTS" WILL BE COLORED BLUE TO REPRESENT TAXIWAY ENDS AND GREEN ON THE APPROACH ENDS.
- PATHWAYS GOING FROM THE SKETER TO THE END OF EACH "RUNWAY" WILL BE TAXIWAYS. THESE PATHWAYS WILL HAVE TAXIWAY LIGHTS TO INCLUDE: YELLOW CENTER LINES AND YELLOW SHORT LINES. "EDGE LIGHTS" WILL BE COLORED BLUE TO REPRESENT TAXIWAY LIGHTS.
- SUB-SURFACE "AIRPORT SIGNAGE" ADJACENT TO THE "WILD SHORT" SIGNS TO IDENTIFY RUNWAYS AND TAXIWAYS SCALED TO FAA SIGNAGE SPEC.
- AT VARIOUS LOCATIONS ALONG THE PATHWAYS INSTALL SIGNAGE WITH QUESTION AND ANSWER CARDS ON AVIATION HISTORY. THE ANSWERS TO THE QUESTIONS ARE THE LINES ON THIS PATHWAY PAINTED YELLOW AND THE LIGHTS ARE BLUE COLORED; 2. "WHY ARE THERE NUMBERS ON THE END OF THE RUNWAY AND HOW ARE THEY DETERMINED?"; 3. "WHAT PERCENTAGE OF AIRPORTS HAVE OPERATING CONTROL TOWERS TO CONTROL AIR TRAFFIC?"; ETC.
- A REAL AIRPLANE ON A MOUNTED ON A PEDESTAL SIMULATING AN AIRPLANE CLIMBING AFTER DEPARTURE FROM THE "RUNWAY". THE PEDESTAL WILL HAVE A 4-SIDED SIGN MOUNTED TO THE BASE. THE NORTH-SIDE SIGN WILL BE VISIBLE FROM THE "CONTROL TOWER" AND WILL SAY "LAKEVIEW DR. WILL SAY "WAUSAU DOWNTOWN" AND WEST SIDE SIGNS VISIBLE FROM THE "CONTROL TOWER" WILL SAY "LAKEVIEW DR. WILL SAY "WAUSAU DOWNTOWN" WITH AN ARROW DIRECTING PEOPLE TOWARD THE AIRPORT AND WOODS PLACE. THE SOUTH SIDE SIGN WILL TELL THE STORY AND HISTORY ABOUT THE AIRPLANE MOUNTED ON THE PEDESTAL.
- THE SKETER TOP WILL BE SHAPED LIKE A HISTORIC ROUND TOPPED HANGAR. THE FACE OF THE ROUND TOP CAN HAVE A SPONSOR NAME PAINTED ON IT PAID FOR WITH "NAMING RIGHTS".
- A SINGLE GYM LOCATED NEAR THE INTERSECTION OF THE RUNWAYS SHAPED LIKE A CONTROL TOWER. KIDS IN THE CONTROL TOWER WILL HAVE UNRESTRICTED VIEW OF THE RUNWAY ENDS SO THAT THEY CAN PRETEND TO DIRECT AIR AND GROUND TRAFFIC AT THEIR AIRPORTS. THIS PLAY FEATURE COULD HAVE A HISTORIC CONTROL TOWER POSSIBLY AN "AIR STAIR" LEADING TO ANOTHER "AIRCRAFT" LOCATED NEARBY.
- WIND SOCK CAN BE INSTALLED ON TOP OF THE "CONTROL TOWER" OR "HANGAR".
- VARIOUS OTHER PLAY "AIRCRAFT" WILL BE LOCATED NEAR THE "CONTROL TOWER" AND "HANGAR" FOR KIDS TO PLAY ON.
- AIRPLANE SHAPED PICNIC TABLES, BENCHES, AND PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT CAN BE PAID FOR WITH "NAMING RIGHTS" FROM PRIVATE DONATIONS FROM NEIGHBORHOOD FAMILIES, INDIVIDUALS, CORPORATIONS, AND ORGANIZATIONS IN THEIR NAME OR IN MEMORANDUM.
- "GLIDER HILL" WILL BE A RISE IN TERRAIN IN THE PARK. IN THE WINTER THE KIDS COULD USE IT TO SLED OR SLIDE DOWN. IN THE SUMMER THEY CAN USE IT TO LAUNCH GLIDERS TO SEE WHO CAN LAUNCH THEIR GLIDERS FARTHEST FROM THE HILL.
- THE "BANG BOARD" CURRENTLY USED FOR TENNIS PRACTICE CAN BE UPDATED. IT COULD BE AN ART PROJECT FOR A SCHOOL. THE BANG BOARD MUST INCORPORATE A HORIZONTAL "WALKWAY". THE MURAL SHOULD DEPICT AN AIRPORT SCENE WITH WAUSAU AIRPORT AND AVIATION HISTORY AS WELL AS CURRENT EVENTS SUCH AS THE BALLOON RALLY, CORPORATE JETS, ETC. THE MURAL WILL BE VISIBLE FROM LAKEVIEW DRIVE.
- INSTALL A DIRT PATH ALONG THE FENCE LINE FROM THE SIDEWALK ALONG LAKEVIEW ON THE NORTHEAST THEN SOUTH TO THE SOUTHEAST CORNER AND THEN WEST TO THE SIDEWALK ON PIED PIPER. ALONG THIS PATH BRICKS OR MARKERS CAN BE INSTALLED IN THE GROUND ALONG THE PATH OR EVEN IN THE PATH INDICATING DISTANCE MARKERS. THIS WOULD BE USED BY ADULTS AS A WALK/JOG PATH.
- ALONG THE PATH CAN BE BODY EXERCISE STATIONS I.E. PULL-UP BARS, DIP BARS, SIT-UP BENCH, PUSH UP BENCH, ETC.

PROJECT UPDATE

Memorial Park Pool

Interior finishing work continues on the bathhouse. Pool mechanical equipment (pumps, filters, boilers, etc.) are being installed in the mechanical room.

Athletic Park Phase 2

All concrete block work is complete. Glulam beams are being installed at the 3rd base concession building. Electrical and plumbing installation continues throughout the project.

Wausau Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan

Four firms (Ayres Associates, Rettler Corp., SEH and Stantec) submitted proposals for the City C.O.R.P. The selection committee consisting of David Oberbeck, Brad Lenz, William Duncanson and Peter Knotek selected Ayres Associates at a cost of \$30,306 to prepare the Wausau 2016-2020 Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan.
