Public Comment on matters appearing on the agenda.

Minutes of previous meeting(s) (6/16/14)

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the minutes of the previous meeting (6/16/14). Motion carried 5-0.

Consider request for waiver of 3.06.010(a) Payment of taxes, claims forfeitures, judgments prior to issuance of license or permit, due to extraordinary financial hardship. (Jaclyn Andersen)

Jaclyn Andersen stated she is the sole supporter of her family of four young children and a husband who is partially disabled and unable to work. She indicated she has a ticket that needs to be paid in order to get her license but she is not able to pay it all at once. She noted she has started to make payments every two weeks and should be able to pay it off in another month. Rayala confirmed that Ms. Andersen made recent payments on July 9th and 15th and the balance due is \$281.80.

Motion by Wagner, second by Neal to approve the request to waive 3.06.010(a). Motion carried 5-0.

Consider various license applications.

Rasmussen indicated there were three Operator Licenses recommended for denial: Samantha Christie, Kent Hubbard, and Ashley Cole. She noted that Kent Hubbard and Ashley Cole were not present.

Samantha Christie addressed the committee stating she was not sure why she denied and that she got into some trouble almost 10 years ago, but has been trying to better herself since then. She indicated she works at Applebee's and her general manager wrote her a letter of recommendation. She stated she would like to work her way to a management position which would require the Operators License.

Chief Hardel stated his denial recommendation was based on a lengthy record consisting of a conviction of Possession of THC in 2003; Felony convictions of Possession of THC in 2004 and 2005; Felony charge of Manufacture/delivery of controlled substance in 2005; and Misdemeanor charge of Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. The denial was based on the totality of the record.

Motion by Kellbach, second by Gisselman to approve or deny licenses as recommended. Motion carried 5-0.

Request for outdoor party August 16, 2014 (Bob & Randy's)

Tana Scobel stated the committee approved an outdoor party last year for Bob & Randy's 25th Anniversary and it turned out very well. She indicated the party they were requesting permission for this year would be very similar, but a little earlier from 2:00 pm - 7:00 pm. The entire parking lot would be fenced; they will use wristbands; and alcohol will not be allowed to be taken from the bar outside to the parking lot. There will also be a polka band playing for two hours. Hardel stated they should be sure to notify the neighbors in advance.

Motion by Gisselman, second by Neal to approve the request for an outdoor party on August 16, 2014 (Bob & Randy's). Motion carried 5-0.

Hearing on Rent Abatement Application of William F. Schillinger concerning 2502 N 6th Street, Apt 2.

William Schillinger explained the issues with no heat began April 7th and the land lord did not respond to his calls and texts so he called the Inspections Department. He indicated he did not pay rent for May or June and he is no longer living there but his personal property was there, but he couldn't get it because the landlord changed the locks.

Rich Grefe, Inspector, submitted the rent abatement sheet for 2502 N 6th St, Apt #2; a posting "Unfit for Human Occupancy" dated April 4, 2014; three letters to S&K Properties; and photos. He indicated there were other issues besides no heat due to a non-functioning furnace, such as a lack of working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Attorney Jim Connell, representing the landlord Bob Karl, submitted exhibits and explained the ownership and foreclosure issues with the property. He stated his clients made repairs and purchased detectors and space heaters. He stated they believed Mr. Schillinger owed them \$270 and did not believe they violated any housing codes.

Grefe confirmed a space heater which was not plugged in was in the apartment when he inspected, but he did not recommend that the tenant use it unless certain of the circuitry. Fire Chief, Tracey Kujawa, noted that fire prevention inspections were done on the property on 4/21/14, 6/10/14, and 7/08/14 and none of the violations that were identified on 4/21 were corrected as of 7/08.

Closed Session pursuant to Section 19.85(1)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes for the purpose of considering the following: Deliberating concerning a case which was the subject of any judicial or quasi-judicial trial or hearing before the governmental body.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to convene in closed session to deliberate. Roll Call Vote: Ayes: Gisselman, Neal, Wagner, Kellbach, Rasmussen. Noes: 0. Motion carried 5-0.

Reconvene in Open Session, announce results of deliberations on Hearing on Rent Abatement Application.

Rasmussen stated in the manner of the rent abatement hearing requested by William Schillinger, Jr., vs Landlord S&K Properties, LLC, this committee finds that there was a lack of heat in the apartment for a period of approximately 27 days and that although an alternate heat source was available, it was not the primary heat source for the building. We find the abatable period April 4 – April 30, 2014 and the 27 day rent calculation is \$256.50, however, based on a good faith effort demonstrated by the landlord to supply a form of heat to the unit, we are only going to award abatement at a rate of 50%. The 50% amount calculates to \$128.25.

Information regarding e-cigarettes (Marathon County Health Dept)

Dot Kalmon conducted an informational PowerPoint presentation on e-cigarettes. Highlights are: they are not regulated nationally or locally; we don't know the health effects; the products are targeting youth-gateway to smoking; they contain chemicals that can turn into carcinogens when heat is applied; may out sell regular cigarettes in two to four years. Its use is called "vaping" and it is not restricted from public places where smoking generally is although it is not clean, healthy air.

Property Maintenance and Housing Code Violation Enforcement Report - Inspections (Bill Hebert)

Bill Hebert reported it has been very helpful to have the new property inspector Rich Grefe on board. He indicated his department has taken over the tall weed ordinance enforcement and are over 75% on this year's notices compared to last year with the help of CSO Officers. He felt it is a better service provided to the citizens of Wausau. Report placed on file.

Discussion and Possible action on Trap-Neuter-Release program (Wausau PD)

Matt Barnes stated the Humane Society of Marathon County advocates for the introduction of a Trap-Neuter-Return Program. He explained it is volunteer based system, not something that the city would be actively involved in. These volunteers would go out and identify the areas of the city where we have current cat colonies, to include residents who might be managing those colonies on their own or supporting stray and feral cats by feeding them. There will be a live trapping operation that is included and those cats would be taken to the Human Society or a participating veterinarian where they would be neutered and ear tipped. He explained ear tipping is basically cutting a quarter to a third off of one ear, which would then easily identify the cat as one that has been through the program. He noted these animals are also vaccinated for rabies and then are returned to that trapping location or to a known colony within that general area.

Barnes stated the problems with stray and feral cats for which we receive complaints are the spraying, loitering, fighting, hunting of birds, occasional cat bites, and the noise during breeding season. The biggest concern however, is the fiscal impact of dealing with this cat population. He estimated the cost \$30,000 - \$40,000 annually to the city and that does not include the police officer time, the humane officer time, or the CSO's time in investigating these situations and dealing with residents who are trying to trap these cats. He pointed out based on information from previous years there is no evidence whatsoever that our cat population is being reduced.

Rasmussen questioned what the cost of an implementation would be. Barnes did not believe the program, which would be a group of volunteers, would be requesting any funding. The more successful they are in recruiting funding and grants to work a program like this reduces their need to come to the city.

Mary Kirlin, Humane Society, addressed the committee in support of this TNR program as viable tool in bringing the stray and feral cat problem under control. She suggested having an expert come to a future meeting from “Friends of Ferals” Program in Dane County, founded by Dr. Susan Kresbach. She indicated Dr. Kresbach was willing to come and she suggested setting up a special meeting in September. Rasmussen indicated they would invite Dan Guild, our Weston partner, and Neal suggested inviting other adjacent communities as well.

Amend Section 17.24.020 Open fire and burning allowed by permit to clarify permit expiration date.

Alfonso stated this amendment clarifies the start and end dates of the five year license period of the burn permit.

Motion by Wagner, second by Neal to approve the amendment to 17.24.020. Motion carried 5-0.

Repeal and recreate Section 9.08.010 Discharging and carrying firearms and guns prohibited.

Lt. Bill Kolb stated this related to the urban bow hunting program because when Wisconsin Act 71 came into law in December it changed our local ordinance significantly. Alfonso explained Wisconsin Act 71 amended the statutes and now prohibits a municipality from prohibiting bow hunting within the municipality. Our current ordinance has a lot of restrictions on bow hunting, including registering with the police department and a requirement for hunters to shoot an arrow from a certain level off the ground (6 feet). Kolb stated the requirement of a hunter being 200 feet from a building owned by another person would not change.

Alfonso stated we decided to repeal the current ordinance and recreate it since there were so many little things that would have had to be amended. She noted a municipality is only allowed to restrict bow hunting up to 100 yards from a building located on someone else’s property, however, we will keep it at 200 feet as Lt. Kolb recommended.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve repealing and recreating Section 9.08.010. Motion carried 5-0.

Amend Section 9.04.010 State statutes adopted to include possession of drug paraphernalia violations

Jim Schroeder, Juvenile Intake, stated we currently receive referral charges from the Wausau PD for possession of drug paraphernalia. He explained he then processes them with an intake meeting; sends them to formal court, which ultimately goes in front of a Judge and results in a forfeiture. He commented this is a long process touching about 25 hands. Schroeder indicated he had the support of Chief Hardel, the District Attorney and Judge for the proposed ordinance which would allow Wausau PD to issue a citation for just possession of drug paraphernalia. This would allow them to be processed just like a disorderly conduct or underage drinking citation through Municipal Court and a forfeiture. He explained it will alleviate a lot of work and effort on both sides; is much more immediate for the juveniles to be brought in front of the Judge, as well as much less expense for the parents.

Motion by Kellbach, second by Wagner to approve the amendment to Section 9.04.010. Motion carried 5-0.

Amend Section 1.01.025(c)(1)(B) Schedule of cash deposits to include possession of drug paraphernalia violations.

Rasmussen noted this is the penalty for the previous ordinance.

Motion by Kellbach, second by Neal to approve the ordinance amending the cash deposits to include possession of drug paraphernalia violations. Motion carried 5-0.

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Chief Hardel presented the Tavern Report from June 04, 2014 through July 06, 2014. (*See attached*)

Wagner had some concerns with the amount of times the new bar, Its Our Clubhouse, was showing up on the report. Hardel stated the owner was cooperative and indicated he would have Lt Baeten meet with the owner and discuss what else PD could provide to help him be successful and he would report back to committee. Intermission noise complaints were discussed and Hardel commented they are very cooperative with the police. Wagner felt the Paradox security camera issue noted in the report was a problem. Hardel agreed they were becoming frustrated with the cooperation of the owner of Paradox. He suggested in the committee consider mandating certain bars to have security camera surveillance implemented that must be working.

Operations Report from Fire Department

Chief Kujawa presented the June 2014 report from the Fire Department to be placed on file.

Communications

Rasmussen questioned if the committee would like to take up and discuss the possibility of a pit bull ban in the city. Neal did not oppose talking about it but did not feel we should be pushing anything at this time.

Update of Rental Licensing Plan – Alfonso

Alfonso stated the city received a service of a Summons and Compliant in connection with its Residential Licensing ordinance. An attorney from Lacrosse has been hired to represent the Apartment Association and a couple of other larger landlords in suing the city regarding the enforceability of the rental licensing ordinance. One part of the lawsuit asks for an injunction against that ordinance. A hearing has been set for Friday on that and also another portion of the Summons and Complaint asking the court to find declaratory judgment that the ordinance would be unenforceable. She stated part of their basis in that complaint argues it is a fourth amendment improper search of a tenant's residence using a landlord to allow a government access to the tenant's property. Another portion refers to the new statute that passed and became effective in March, which in part states a municipality cannot enact or enforce an ordinance which requires a landlord to provide any information concerning a landlord or a tenant to the municipality. She indicated the city has referred it to their insurance carrier and the Attorney's Office is researching the various issues.

Adjournment

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 8:47 pm.

identified as her boyfriend. She reported she was upset as the male was moving to Chicago. The female was brought home and turned over to her parents.

A subsequent phone call was made to Mr. Kurzynski on 07-06-14 at 8:15pm to confirm that there was no video surveillance footage of the rear exterior of Paradox. Mr. Kurzynski advised there were no exterior video cameras operable at Paradox. When asked how long the cameras had not been operable, he stated it had been about 1 year. *This information seems to directly conflict with the information provided to an officer on the above-mentioned incident (case #14-5242), in which a bicycle was stolen and Mr. Kurzynski provided video surveillance footage of the rear exterior of Paradox.*

The victim in this incident stated he did not know the suspect, and he did not want anything further done at this point.

8.08.200 Dangerous animals.

(e) Procedure for declaring a prohibited dangerous animal.

- (1) The chief of police or the chief's designee, upon conducting an investigation, may issue an order declaring an animal to be a prohibited dangerous animal and order the animal to have a microchip or other device inserted for identification purposes, whenever he/she finds that an animal meets the definition of prohibited dangerous animal in subsection (b). The cost of a microchip or other device shall be at the expense of the owner or caretaker. An owner or caretaker wishing to contest an order under this section shall proceed as provided in subsection (f).

....

(h) Impoundment.

- (1) Pending any investigation as to whether an animal is a dangerous or prohibited dangerous animal or pending a hearing on an appeal under subsection (f) of either determination, the animal must be securely confined in a humane manner either on the premises of the owner or caretaker, with a licensed veterinarian or other appropriate facility such as the local humane society. The owner or caretaker of any animal impounded on the premises of the owner or caretaker must comply with the restrictions set forth in subsection (d)(3) and (d)(5)-(d)(7). The chief of police or the chief's designee and may order impoundment of the animal pending his/her investigation through any appeal hearing under subsection (f), pursuant to Section 173.13(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes. Section 1. That Section 8.08.120 Number of dogs and cats limited, is hereby amended to read as follows:

8.08.120 Number of dogs and cats limited. (a) Limitation. No more than two dogs and/or three cats, over the age of five months, shall be kept in or upon one residential unit or by one or more persons constituting one residential unit, unless the premises is licensed as a kennel or as provided in subsection (b).

(b) Temporary Pet License.

(1) Intent. It is the intent of the city that individuals who are currently not in compliance with the limitation in subsection (a) of this section have the opportunity to come into compliance by allowing their dog(s) and/or cat(s) that exceed the limitation to live out the remainder of their lives in the care of these pet owners, or for these pet owners to find other, agreeable living arrangements for their animals in their discretion. It is further the intent of the city to have these individuals come fully in to compliance with the limitation in subsection (a) of this section in the future at the natural end of the lives of their animals that exceed the limitation. It is not the intention of the city to create or permit a permanent exception to the dog and cat limitation.

(2) One or more persons residing together in one single-family or two-family residential unit may obtain a temporary pet license permitting not more than ___ dogs and/or ___ cats over the age of five months in such residential unit only under the following circumstances:

(A) Because of the recent cohabitation of two individuals, each of whom had dog(s) and/or cat(s) prior to the cohabitation, a residential unit now exceeds the limitation in subsection (a) of this section;

(B) Because of the death of a family member, an individual has come into the possession of dog(s) and/or cat(s) of such family member causing the number of dog(s) and/or cat(s) in the residential unit to exceed the limitation in subsection (a) of this section; or,

(C) An individual residing in the city as of _____, 2012, and who was not in compliance with the provisions of subsection (a) of this section prior to such date.

(3) A temporary pet license is valid for 12 months and must be renewed annually on or before _____ where the limit in subsection (a) continues to be exceeded. The number of dog(s) and/or cat(s) permitted under the temporary pet license will be reviewed annually to determine which animals are being kept within the city. In the event of the death or relocation of any animal registered under the temporary pet license, the number of animals permitted shall be decreased accordingly and no such animal shall be replaced.

(4) An individual may apply for and be granted a temporary pet license from the public health and safety committee upon compliance with the following:

(A) Files with the city clerk a fully executed application on a form prescribed by the city clerk, proof of current license under section 8.08.170, and submission of a photograph and description of each animal to be included the temporary pet license, together with a certification from a licensed veterinarian estimating the age of each such animal.

ALTERNATIVE: Require implementation of a microchip for each animal.

(A) Submission of a sworn statement, together with supporting documentation, concerning the facts and circumstances giving rise to the exemption under subparagraph.

(B) The applicant(s) is not in violation, or has not violated within the previous two (2) years, any provision of this chapter.

(C) The applicant(s) does not have a conviction for cruelty, neglect or mistreatment of an animal.

(D) Payment of a temporary pet license fee of \$ _____ per animal to be paid at the time of application.

(5) The residential unit in which such dog(s) and/or cat(s) are harbored shall be maintained in a sanitary condition and all animal feces must be removed and sanitarly disposed of promptly. Failure to comply with such requirements shall be grounds for revocation or non-renewal of the temporary pet license.

(6) A temporary pet license granted hereunder may be revoked, suspended, or not renewed for just cause, upon notice and an opportunity to be heard. The hearing shall be conducted by the public health and safety committee.

(7) A temporary pet license is only valid for the dog(s) and/or cat(s) described in the original license issued under this section. At no time may any additional or different dog or cat be substituted under the license. Any attempt to substitute additional or different dog(s) and/or cat(s) shall be grounds for immediate revocation or non-renewal of the temporary pet license for the remaining animals.

(8) A temporary pet license shall be prominently displayed on the premises of the residential unit.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Comments Concerning Draft
Revisions to WMC §8.08.120
Number of Dogs and Cats Limited

CONSIDERATIONS:

- Should issuance of a temporary pet license be limited to one and two-family dwelling units or by lot size?
- Define "family member." Propose: Father, mother, maternal or paternal grandparent, sister, brother, or child of the applicant. If the Committee votes to approve the proposed ordinance revisions, the Committee should consider at this time, giving authority to the City Attorney to proceed to amend WMC §8.08.001 Definitions to include such definition of "family member."
- The draft proposed ordinance provides for those individuals who are currently not complying with the dog and cat limitation to come into compliance. However, the ordinance as drafted is not intended to permit individuals to become out of compliance before adoption of the ordinance simply in order to take advantage of its provisions. The challenge, however, would be determining whether an individual previously owned the pet, or just acquired the pet prior to adoption of the ordinance.
- The draft of the ordinance currently provides that the Public Health and Safety Committee will review and approve temporary pet licenses, as well as conduct hearings on the revocation, suspension or non-renewal of temporary pet licenses. If not this Committee, some other entity or department will need to be designated for these activities and invested with that authority.
- Will the City Clerk be able to check on whether animals have a current license at the time of application, or will applicants need to provide this information? Currently the draft ordinance required applicants to provide proof of current license.
- Currently the draft ordinance provides that documentation will need to be submitted verifying the dog(s) and/or cat(s) subject to the temporary pet license. This information will need to be re-supplied each year by an applicant seeking to renew the license and the documentation compared with previous applications concerning those animals in order to verify these are the same animals. An alternative would be to require the implementation of a microchip in each animal and have a certificate provided by a veterinarian each year that the animal is still living.
- Should a limit be applied such that an individual who has received a temporary pet license in the past and then ultimately come into compliance, be excluded from obtaining any other temporary pet licenses in the future notwithstanding the reason?

- (4) Is not in violation or has not violated within the previous two (2) years, any provision of this chapter.
- (5) Does not have a conviction for cruelty, neglect or mistreatment of an animal.
- (6) Pet fancier's permits shall expire on December 31 each year.
- (7) The premises upon which the dogs and/or cats are kept is maintained in accordance with section 8.08.140, and said compliance is demonstrated to city personnel empowered to enforce this ordinance upon request; inspection of the premises and all animals located at the premises shall be permitted at any time.

(8) When issued, a permit shall be kept upon the licensed premises and exhibited upon request to city personnel empowered to enforce this ordinance.

(9) Only one pet fancier permit may be issued per dwelling unit.

(10) Revocation, suspension and non-renewal of permit. Permits granted hereunder may be revoked, suspended or not renewed for just cause, upon notice and an opportunity to be heard. The hearing shall be conducted by the public health and safety committee.

- (3) Provides proof of a current license for each animal covered by the permit.
- (4) Is not in violation or has not violated within the previous two (2) years, any provision of this chapter.
- (5) Does not have a conviction for cruelty, neglect or mistreatment of an animal.
- (6) Pet fancier's permits shall expire on December 31 each year.
- (7) The premises upon which the dogs and/or cats are kept is maintained in accordance with section 8.08.140, and said compliance is demonstrated to city personnel empowered to enforce this ordinance upon request; inspection of the premises and all animals located at the premises shall be permitted at any time.

(8) When issued, a permit shall be kept upon the licensed premises and exhibited upon request to city personnel empowered to enforce this ordinance.

(9) Only one pet fancier permit may be issued per dwelling unit.

(10) Revocation, suspension and non-renewal of permit. Permits granted hereunder may be revoked, suspended or not renewed for just cause, upon notice and an opportunity to be heard. The hearing shall be conducted by the public health and safety committee.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.




