### **Public Comment on matters appearing on the agenda.**

None.

### **Minutes of previous meeting(s) (8/18/14 & 9/04/14)**

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the minutes of the previous meetings (8/18/14 & 9/04/14). Motion carried 5-0.

### **Discussion with premises owner, Bryan Morel, about management issues and police call volume identified at Its Our Clubhouse tavern and possible action thereon.**

Rasmussen stated the committee has become concerned with the police call volume to It's Our Clubhouse. She informed Mr. Morel that they would not discuss the details of specific incidents that occurred at his establishment unless he requested that they do so. Furthermore, as we enter into the discussion of those details, they become a part of the record that could be used in future hearings. She questioned if he was willing to discuss incidents to date and Morel responded that he was willing.

Chief Hardel indicated he spoke with Mr. Morel twice on the phone last week and requested that he come to City Hall to obtain copies of the reports that were provided to the committee. Hardel indicated Mr. Morel now has the same police report documentation that the committee has reviewed and he would let that stand on its own rather than going into detail. Hardel felt it was very clear that Mr. Morel has displayed a lack of cooperation with police; he has a lack of desire to be a good neighbor; and he is mismanaging the tavern. He requested the Public Health & Safety Committee to re-evaluate the issuance of the liquor license to Mr. Morel.

Rasmussen pointed out at the initial Liquor License Review Subcommittee meeting at which his license application was considered, Morel was told the clientele in the premises he was establishing would certainly need management control. She questioned if he had a plan moving forward to address the issues shown in the reports.

Bryan Morel stated that he has asked for police assistance and has requested not only the drug dogs to come through the premises, but also undercover officers, but he did not believe that has happened. He acknowledged there were a few incidents where his interaction with officers could have been better, but we all have bad days and he was willing to apologize to the officers for his attitude. He indicated they have done some things to alleviate the noise complaints; they have been closing the doors instead of leaving them open at night. There were picnic tables on the north side of the building for people who went out to smoke and they have now moved them to the south side of the building. He indicated he planned to enclose the wheelchair ramp with canvas type walls that would roll up to keep noise in and people from going out to the parking lot to smoke. He stated they are looking to reopen the kitchen and begin serving food in a few weeks which he felt would help facilitate changing the type of clientele.

Rasmussen requested Morel address the number of fights that have been taking place, which on a couple of occasions took a large response from the Police Department and on one occasion even additional help from the Sheriff's Department. Morel stated the incident with the involvement of the Sheriff's Department didn't take place on his property, it was across the street in Kohlman's parking lot. He reiterated that he himself has called police for help. Rasmussen pointed out he refused to name a known individual who offered him drugs in the bar and refused to turn over the video. Morel indicated the individual was one of the vendors of his establishment and he didn't want to lose his business. He stated he still had the video and would turn it over if subpoenaed to do so. Wagner expressed frustration over Morel's resistance to providing information and disrespectful attitude with police.

Hardel pointed out Lt. Baeten referred to 24 incidents in the report to the committee, however, he just put down "noteworthy" incidents; there were actually 47 calls to the bar overall, which has only been open 90 days. He noted Morel has repeatedly told officers they are not welcome on his property. He noted officers have been there on approximately 11 noise complaints, most of which the doors were open and Morel did not want to close them. Patrons were going outside with their drinks and in one incident the bartender said she couldn't control the crowd or prevent them from taking drinks outside, so Morel was called and agreed to close the bar down for the night.

Neal commented about over-serving in reference to the bar's \$10 all you can drink rail special, and provided suggestions for patron management. Hardel indicated they had squad videos of activity outside the bar.

Rasmussen questioned what the recommendation of the Police Department was. Hardel stated there was 100 demerit points against the license, but he pointed out there should have actually been other citations. The department was very willing to work with Morel early on and there were a number of noise complaints that were validated where he received only verbal warnings. He has two documented citations for disturbing the peace. He recommended the liquor license be re-evaluated based on the activity they have seen and the reports provided. Rasmussen stated the committee could consider a limited term suspension, not necessarily a revocation. In some other cases suspensions have worked to address the issues and have had some impact.

Wagner felt he should be given some time off to get with the professionals and put a plan in place that specifies how he is going change his management and bartender culture; how to anticipate and control the crowd; and how to police and control the exterior of his building.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to move to a suspension hearing and for Morel to come to the hearing with a written plan to be responsible bar owner and manager. Motion carried 5-0.

**Consider Wausau Police Department's proposal in response to the Wausau School District's Council presentation.**

Hardel indicated he met with the school district four separate times to discuss how they could provide a better safety net for the schools. He presented a proposal to them and the school district unanimously approved it, as well as the school board; it is now moving to a funding stage. He indicated he also presented it the city Human Resources Committee and it was approved.

Hardel explained the plan is to expand our SRO (School Resources Officer) program. Currently there are three SRO's; one at Wausau East HS, one at Wausau West HS and the middle schools share one position. There has not been a SRO program for the elementary schools. He noted service calls to the elementary schools in the last couple years has gone up dramatically. He proposed expanding the SRO program to have one dedicated SRO for Horace Mann Middle School and all of the elementary schools on the east side of the river, and one SRO dedicated for John Muir Middle School and all of the elementary schools on the west side. There would be a schedule where they would be attending those grade schools throughout the week, meeting with the principal and any other staff that might have information. He felt it was imperative for the schools to continue to have that educational component from the police department. Hardel indicated he is requesting the position be split financially, 50% by the school district and 50% by the city. The other component in this proposal is a Neighborhood/Community Resource Officer to work in concert with the SRO's. He explained if the SRO's and a particular school identify problem houses or problem individuals and can't address all of their needs, then they would pass it to the Neighborhood Officer to pick up and address. He indicated they have approached the Alexander Foundation for funding of this additional position, which has agreed to fund it 100% for a year contingent upon the city and school district funding the other position.

**Consider various license applications.**

Rasmussen stated all licenses on the list are recommended for approval and one special event application.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to approve licenses as recommended. Motion carried 5-0.

**Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities**

Chief Hardel presented the Tavern Report from August 4, 2014 thru September 4, 2014. (*See attached report.*)

**Operations Report from Fire Department for August 2014**

Chief Kujawa presented the Fire Department report for August. No discussion; report placed on file.

**Communications**

Rayala stated since the Pet Fancier Permit was approved by Council the application has been set up and there have been several inquiries. Rasmussen noted the city newsletter will contain an article on the new permit as well.

**Adjournment**

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 6:17 pm.

**NOTABLE INCIDENTS THAT OCCURRED AT TAVERNS TO WHICH POLICE WERE DISPATCHED.**

**101 Pub**, 101 N. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Event #140091659, 08-04-14 at 7:33pm: Officers were dispatched for a report of a belligerent male refusing to leave. The reporting party remained anonymous. Upon arrival, the bartender denied there being a problem there.

**6th Street Pub**, 2002 N. 6<sup>th</sup> St., Event #140099939, 08-23-14 at 10:20pm: Officer on patrol observed what was believed to be a fight in progress. After turning around to investigate, it was learned that the individuals involved were friends and stated they were just playing around. They were very intoxicated. They were told to settle down

for the evening.

**Bob & Randy's Bar**, 1515 N. 6<sup>th</sup> St., Event #140096986, 08-17-14 at 3:50am: Officer dispatched an address in the 500 block of Stark St. for a report of a male that had been punched earlier outside of Bob & Randy's Bar. The male stated he was very intoxicated and did not know who punched him. He could not remember any other details, and did not want to pursue anything at this time. Officer provided his business card to the male and advised him to call the next day when he was sober if he changes his mind.

**Bull Falls Brewery**, 901 E. Thomas St., Event #140091699, 08-04-14 at 8:52pm. Officer responded to Bull Falls Brewery along with paramedics from Wausau Fire Department for a report of a male that had fallen and was vomiting. The male reportedly has had a previous stroke.

**Cabaret**, 204 E. Rib Mountain Dr., Event #140091274, 08-04-14 at 2:13am: Cabaret bartender reported that a male and female were in the bar causing a disturbance. He said he asked them to leave but they refused. The bartender said the disruptive male took a swing at him, so he took him to the ground and held him there until he calmed down. The couple then left. Officers located the couple a short distance away. They were very intoxicated. The male alleged the bartender assaulted him after losing a game of pool. The male said he did not want to pursue charges. He was very intoxicated, and his story did not seem to match the details of the incident.

**Cruise In**, 1724 Merrill Ave., Event #140091276, 08-04-14 at 2:21am: Offices were dispatched for a report of a group of people fighting. It was learned that a male and female were arguing about their past relationship. Both had been drinking and eventually left without further incident.

**Denmar Tavern**, 601 W. Thomas St., Event #140094692, 08-11-14 at 11:14pm: Anonymous party reported people outside yelling and screaming. Responding officer made contact with the bartender who advised that a couple of intoxicated persons came in and were told to leave due to their intoxication. They were not happy and began causing a disturbance by yelling as they left. They were gone by the time officers arrived.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140091749, 08-04-14 at 11:34pm: Officers responded for a report of a patron threatening the bartender and/or bar owner. Officer comments are as follows: "Spoke to bartender and he stated that the male came up to a different patron and stated that he put stuff on his truck.. the bartender approached him and told him to leave and the guy had a cue ball in his hand... the male gave it to the bartender and walked out of the door...nothing further at this time...3121." And "Made contact with the male party on S. 5th Ave/West St. who advised the owner of the bar got mad at him because he was speaking with a blonde female who caught his attention. The male party advised the owner got jealous, got in his face making derogatory comments, so he made comments back. The male party advised nothing physical happened between he and the owner and he left to avoid additional issues. Officers spoke with the owner of It's Our Clubhouse, who advised the male party was not welcome back at his business. This was explained to the male party who advised he didn't plan on coming back to the bar. Male party was released from the scene. The bar owner advised he did not want to pursue charges from this incident. Nothing further."

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140092189, 08-06-14 at 12:07am: Officer made contact with It's Our Clubhouse bar owner regarding a complaint of profanity from patrons outside the bar. He advised he would try to contain the situation.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7027, 08-09-14 at 1:28am: Officers were dispatched to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of a possible domestic disturbance. A bouncer from It's Our Clubhouse chased after a male that been asked to leave the bar following an altercation he had with a female. The intoxicated female was located at the bar and was eventually cited for Disorderly Conduct due to her behavior. The male and bouncer were located near KFC and the male was arrested for Domestic Disorderly Conduct.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7028, 08-09-14 at 2:51am: Officers on scene for the above-cited incident at It's Our Clubhouse reported witnessing multiple fights at the bar requiring numerous officers. Officers observed three other fights in the vicinity to the bar. One fight was observed outside the north side entrance to the bar. A female party had a seizure after the altercation and had to be taken to Aspirus by ambulance. Officers then observed two additional fights starting across the street from the bar in Kohlman's parking lot, while other officers were tending to the female party having a seizure. No arrests were made from the incidents due to officers stopping

physical altercations from taking place. The parties involved in all three fights were patrons at It's Our Clubhouse bar. The owner Bryan Morel was warned about his bartenders over serving their patrons and about the commotion happening because of his bar. On this night, the bar had all you can drink rail drinks for \$10.00. A total of (6) officers had to respond to It's Our Clubhouse between 0129hrs and 0251hrs. Informational report was completed.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7225, 08-16-14 at 1:25am: Offices responded to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of loud noise, people screaming, and patrons parking in the parking spots of building tenants next door. Officers took time to locate the owners of the vehicles from inside It's Our Clubhouse to have the vehicles removed (instead of ticketing the vehicles). The bouncer stated the owner was out of town, and the only people working there were two bartenders and him. He said it was too much work for him to manage all the people

Officers talked to one of the bartenders, who stated she was one of the two bartenders working. She talked to the owner about only having three staff on hand and said it would not be enough. She asked an officer if she needed to close down early and was told no.

Officer spoke with the owner using the bartender's phone. After contact with the bartender concluded, officers walked across S. 3rd Avenue to the parking lot of Kohlman's Grocery. The bartender came across street and said the owner was on the phone and wanted to talk to officers, she the phone was in speaker mode. Owner told officers that police were banned from his property and to stay off his property.

Disturbing the Peace citation was issued to It's Our Clubhouse LLC.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140098086 and Case #14-7334, 08-19-14 at 10:11pm: Officer initially responded to It's Our Clubhouse to speak with the owner about his concerns about drug activity in the bar. The owner later called back to report that one of his patrons entered the bar and offered the bartenders some pills. The pills were turned over to the officer. The medications included 2 capsules of M. Amphet Salts 10mg (CNS Stimulant) and 3 tablets of M. Amphet Salts 10mg (CNS Stimulant). Both bartenders provided written statements regarding the incident, however, the owner said he would not give officers the name of the suspect who offered and exchanged illegal prescription medications within his bar, nor would he release the video footage showing the exchange. The owner said the suspect is a vendor of his who is responsible for supplying numerous products to his business, including, but not limited to: his jukebox, pool table, gambling machines, etc. The owner said he does not want to risk the suspect becoming upset and pulling his product from his business. However, the owner said if the suspect commits this act in his bar again, he would not hesitate to give the police his information. Due to lack of suspect information, and cooperation from the reporting party, a report was completed for informational purposes only.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140099049, 08-21-14 at 10:18pm: Officers responded to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of a group of males outside the business using foul language. The anonymous reporting party had advised that they did not want their children to hear that kind of language. Upon officer arrival, the males were no longer outside. Officers described contacting the owner as a courtesy to advise him of the complaint, and confirmed that no enforcement action was being taken. The owner advised the officers that contacting him at the bar was inappropriate, and they had no reason to be in his bar.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7461, 08-23-14 at 2:24am: Officer on patrol observed an altercation taking place on West St. next to It's Our Clubhouse involving approximately 6 individuals. It was eventually determined that these were patrons from the tavern. Additional officers were requested to assist with the large, unruly crowd that was in the parking lot and property to the southwest of the tavern. Squad video of one unit's response showed dozens of people milling about in the parking lot. As officers attempted to regain control of the situation, they directed the crowd to disperse. This went on for several minutes, as many individuals seemed reluctant to comply. It was reported that the owner, who was present inside the bar and also observed by officers outside amongst these individuals in the parking lot, neglected to assist officers with removing these individuals from his property.

In total, (7) Wausau PD Officers and (1) Sheriff Deputy had to respond to It's Our Clubhouse to assist with the altercation and help calm the situation down. Officers did not arrest any individuals in reference to this incident due to the parties involved being uncooperative. Officers were also distracted by unruly patrons who refused to calm

down and or cooperate with Officers; therefore, allowing possible suspects to leave the scene unnoticed. Officers were out-numbered during this incident.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140099949, 08-23-14 at 10:43pm: Officers responded for a report of two females creating a disturbance in the parking lot. It was discovered that one of the females was a bartender from the tavern. The owner had just fired her this evening. She was upset, and the other female was trying to calm her down. Both were warned about the noise level. The fired employee went to her nearby residence before officers left, and the other female went inside the tavern.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140099973, 08-23-14 at 11:57pm: Officer responded to the tavern for a report of loud music when the door is opened and a loud crowd outside. When the officer drove past the business the door was closed. Officer only observed the door being opened when patrons were exiting to smoke outside. The noise was reportedly not loud enough or of sufficient duration to be considered for enforcement action.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7461, 08-23-14 at 2:24am: Officers were dispatched for a report of possible family disturbance inside a vehicle parked in the lot at the tavern. Investigation showed that a male and female were having a verbal argument. They advised that their children were involved in the recent rollover traffic crash outside of Wausau, and they have experienced stress from this. The female advised she was fine, and she was waiting for a friend to take her home. Both individuals were advised to keep the noise down. They indicated they would.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140102178, 08-29-14 at 12:32am: Dispatch received information regarding possible drug activity in a vehicle at the tavern. A plate number was provided, including information that two males in the vehicle were talking with patrons in the tavern about drugs they have. An additional vehicle was described as being en route to the area to purchase drugs. The plate number provided did not match any vehicle. ATL (Attempt To Locate) was given out on multiple law enforcement radio frequencies, and an email was sent to the Special Investigations Unit. No officer was dispatched to the tavern.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140102624, 08-29-14 at 10:36pm: Anonymous party requested extra patrol around the area of the tavern, reporting that the reporting individual's fence was broken from tavern patrons jumping over it each weekend. The reporting individual sounded very intoxicated and did not want to speak with an officer or file a report.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7702, 08-30-14 at 12:08am: Officers were dispatched for a report of "booming" music coming from the tavern. Responding officer parking nearby reported he could hear the music a block away. The door was reportedly open at the time, and when the staff member working the door saw the officers he shut the door. The music could not be heard then. After making contact with the owner, Bryan Morel, he was advised that a citation for Disturbing the Peace would be issued. The owner reportedly said, "Wow, really. You do what you have to." He then told an officer standing about three feet off the sidewalk onto the parking lot of the tavern, "You need to get off my property." The owner then asked officers to get the shift supervisor there. Lt. Heindel arrived a short time later to speak with the owner. At one point, a patron opened the door to exit the tavern, and the music was much quieter. The owner stated the music level had not changed all night long. He went on to say that this shift is the only group of officers he has a problem with.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140104196, 09-02-14 at 6:50pm: Officer were dispatched for a report of a confused, elderly woman there. The female was looking for a place to stay after having been dropped off at the Salvation Army. She was given a ride to the Super 8 Motel and provided a voucher to stay for the evening. She advised she would be following up with her agent at Aging and Disability tomorrow to try to get back to Superior, WI., where she has family.

**Jim's Corner Pub**, 1244 S. 9<sup>th</sup> Ave., Event #140093496, 08-08-14 at 11:33pm: Officers responded along with paramedics from Wausau Fire Department for a report an unconscious male in the parking lot. The male was found to be intoxicated and he was transported to Aspirus Wausau Hospital for further treatment.

**Labor Temple**, 318 S 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Event #140103130, 08-31-14 at 3:04am: Officers were dispatched for a report of a black male and two white males fighting. A few bar patrons reported being outside when they were approached by the three males who began to argue with them. The black male reportedly began swinging at one of the other

patrons. Officers observed an abrasion on his ear, but he declined pursuing charges. Officers checked the area, but were unable to locate the three males.

**Lumpy's**, 265 Chellis St., Case #14-7509, 08-24-14 at 9:43pm: Officers were dispatched for a report of a fight inside the bar. The victim and witnesses report two males assaulted the victim by strangling him and punching him numerous times. Both suspects were later located. One was arrested for Disorderly Conduct, Battery, Bail Jumping, and Strangulation. The second male was referred for Disorderly Conduct and Battery.

**Lumpy's**, 265 Chellis St., Event #140103252, 08-31-14 at 1:44am: Officers were dispatched for a report of a fight outside the tavern, in which a male was allegedly "jumped" by a male and female that arrived in a vehicle. The victim then ran toward 3M Park. All parties were located. Their accounts of the incident were very different. None of the parties were interested in going to jail or pursuing charges.

**North End Pub**, 1002 N. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Case #14-7046, 08-09-14 at 5:07pm: Officer responded to North End Pub for a report of a male inside the bar who was on probation and in violation of his rules of supervision. The male was located and transported to corrections for a DOC warrant. Officers had responded the previous day for a similar report, but the male was gone prior to officer arrival.

**Oz**, 320 Washington St., Case #14-7310, 08-15-14 at 1:15am: Community Service Officer on patrol observed a male standing in front of Oz with an open bottle of Miller beer. Contact was made with the male. He was very cooperative and was told that a citation would be mailed to him.

**Paradox**, 932 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Case #14-7384, 08-21-14 at 1:15am: Officers were dispatched for a report of a fight. Upon arrival, the victim was located inside the bar. He advised he was approached by a male who stated he wanted to buy marijuana from him. The victim had told the male to leave him alone. The suspect advised he was Chicago, and punched the victim several times before leaving on foot. Officers located the suspect nearby. He was intoxicated and denied having been an altercation. The male was placed under arrest for Battery and transported to corrections.

**Polack Inn**, 1206 N. 3<sup>rd</sup> St., Case #14-7492, 08-24-14 at 1:43am: Officer on patrol observed a male outside the bar with a container of Pabst beer. The male was starting to walk across the street to another tavern when he was stopped. The male stated he was not aware that it was illegal to have open alcohol containers on the street. He stated he had come from the Polack Inn and was walking across the street to see a friend. Officer made contact with the bartender at Polack Inn, who stated he was not aware the male was outside with the alcohol.

**Roc's Place**, 810 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Case #14-7227, 08-16-14 at 5:03am: Officers responded for a report of a male yelling for help near the railroad tracks near Roc's Place. The male had injuries to his face, and appeared to have been there some time. He reported having been at Roc's Place earlier in the morning. He said he didn't recalled how he ended up outside, but the next thing he remembered was being assaulted by two males that had been inside the bar. Contact was made at the bar the next evening. The bartender remembered the victim being there, but did not recall anyone matching the suspect descriptions. No video surveillance footage available. Investigation continues.
