### **Public Comment on matters appearing on the agenda.**

- 1) Deb Ryan, 702 Elm St, stated she owns both a cat and a dog which are licensed but was concerned that the neighbors may have cats and were probably not licensing them and these cats could harm her dog.
- 2) John Schaefer, 1102 McIntosh St, spoke in favor of a pet fancier ordinance because there were many responsible pet owners that may inherit animals or other situations that may put them over the limit.

### **Minutes of previous meeting(s) (7/21/14)**

Motion by Wagner, second by Gisselman to approve the minutes of the previous meeting (7/21/14). Motion carried 4-0.

### **Formal expression of concern regarding alcohol policy violations noted at the WI Valley Fair - Burns Post VFW**

Chief Hardel stated Lt. Todd Baeten worked the fair on August 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> and on August 2<sup>nd</sup> he was advised an officer had observed at least 10 individuals with cups of beer inside the grandstands and after speaking with them all stated they came from the VFW beer tent. Concerns were relayed to the individuals working the gates and it was felt they had dismissive attitudes regarding the problem. He stated Lt Baeten positioned himself to observe the next day and witnessed people walking out with beer in front of the volunteers at the gate who did not attempt to stop them. Hardel noted the VFW is the only beer tent on the fairgrounds that does not hire private security. He felt they should be mandated to hire security in the future.

Roger Sydow and Jack Pettit of the VFW were present. Sydow addressed the committee and expressed his opinion regarding the situation, adding that he felt he had been trying to cooperate and that he was concerned. He indicated they were short on volunteers to work the gate this year, but thought that they had a good record in the past. He indicated he removed the volunteer who was observed letting people out and stated he would put an individual who recently retired from the Sheriff's Department on the front gate next year during the busy time. He also planned on narrowing the entrance gate to keep a better eye on those exiting.

Wagner stated the VFW was the oldest organization serving beer at the fair and it appeared that the problem was a recent one, so he was not ready to force them to hire private security yet. He suggested they put together a list of gate responsible people and they be required to meet with police department regarding the requirements for letting people in and out. He also suggested signs put on the exits stating "No Alcohol Past This Point." Hardel reiterated the issue was cooperation and the lieutenant did not feel they took the whole issue seriously; however, they will be happy to work with the VFW and will provide whatever training is necessary. Wagner stated this is a compromise and if there are the same problems next year the committee can decide if they want to mandate private security.

### **Consider ideas and options to increase pet licensing compliance for cats and cat licensing revenue for the 2015 budget year**

Rasmussen stated this item came at the request of the Finance Committee because of the abysmal cooperation from cat owners in licensing said cats the revenue stream derived from pet licensing is not enough to sustain animal control as an enterprise fund. She noted in the past we have talked about finding a way for the Humane Society to sell our licenses and they have been reluctant to do so, but she suggested we try to engage them in conversation about it again for the next licensing year. Another idea was holding a pet license clinic on a Saturday in connection with a micro-chip clinic. It could be a day where people can bring their pet and get it taken care of at a central location.

Wagner suggested having something associated with pet parks and having activities that bring animal lovers out. Hardel indicated the Humane Officer, Ashlee Bishop, has been assigned to hold a couple of these types of events and either he or she could give a report on it next month. Rasmussen stated the vaccines and/or micro-chipping could possibly be offered at a lower price than the vets to attract people. Hardel indicated Bishop had a vet on board who would do it at a minimum fee. Wagner suggested going out to the service clubs for support. He indicated the

Wausau Noon Optimists could possibly support an event and that he would approach the board. Rasmussen stated educational programs for both youth and pet owners could be implemented as well. Wagner commented they could consider using a campaign on Facebook or Twitter; Rasmussen suggested “Ashlee’s Corner” on Facebook.

**Amend Section 8.08.200 Dangerous animals relative to micro-chipping.**

Alfonso explained the ordinance would require that an animal that has been designated as prohibited dangerous be mandatorily micro-chipped before being released and/or removed from the city.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to approve the amendment to 8.08.200. Motion carried 4-0.

**Ordinance Amending Section 8.08.120 Number of dogs and cats limited - Discussion and possible action in reference to a pet fancier permit.**

Rasmussen explained this committee actually approved this once before, but when it went to Council it failed because we still didn’t have effective animal control in place. This would be an additional revenue source and would be helpful to the responsible pet owner.

The committee had considered a temporary pet license for a person that had excess pets for a temporary period of time and/or a pet fancier for those that would permanently like to have pets in excess of the ordinance limit. Wagner indicated he supported a pet fancier permit but felt they should consider limiting the lot size or the size of the dwelling. Rasmussen suggested they consider whether to permit it for one and two family dwellings versus multi-family buildings. Wagner felt we did not need both a temporary pet license and a pet fancier permit. Alfonso agreed and added that a temporary license would be much more complicated and harder to track and enforce.

Hardel commented from a law enforcement standpoint he did not support any increase in animals, because if we allow more animals there will be more calls. He felt the ordinance was working sufficiently and effectively.

Consensus of the committee was to put forward the pet fancier permit only. Alfonso stated she would clarify in the ordinance that it can be terminated, revoked or non-renewed for a violation of any provision of Chapter 8.08 relative to animals or Wisconsin Statute 9.59 regarding the mistreatment or neglect of animals.

Motion by Wagner, second by Gisselman to approve a pet fancier permit with not more than five (5) cats or dogs combined, with the maximum number of dogs being four (4) and the maximum number of cats being four (4); limited to a single or two family dwelling; and set the fee at \$35. Motion carried 4-0.

**Consider various license applications.**

Rasmussen indicated all licenses were recommended for approval this month. She noted Wausau Area 4<sup>th</sup> of July Celebration organization applied for a Class B picnic license for the Wausau Marathon at Marathon Park. She commented the management should be reminded to ensure that people do not leave the beer tent area with alcohol.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to approve or deny licenses as recommended by staff. Motion carried 4-0.

**Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities**

Chief Hardel presented the Tavern Report from July 7, 2014 through August 3, 2014. *(Attached)*

Rasmussen questioned Chief Hardel regarding the activity at It’s Our Clubhouse, commenting things seem to be getting out of hand. Hardel stated officers went to discuss a report with owner Bryan Morel, who became defensive, combative and very disrespectful. He was heard to say he was done cooperating with police and they were not allowed in his bar unless it was official business. Hardel requested that Mr. Morel be asked to report to Public Health & Safety and indicated he would prepare a report for their review in advance. Wagner was concerned over the attitude he has taken as a new bar owner. Hardel commented the officers have given him numerous verbal warnings in an effort to work with him and now we feel there should have been citations issued. He refuses to shut the door and the windows and we continue to get noise complaints. Rasmussen directed the clerk to send owner Bryan Morel a letter inviting him to appear at the September meeting for dialogue with management over recent events. Kellbach was concerned a lot could happen between now and the next meeting. Rasmussen indicated if necessary a special meeting could be scheduled.

### **Operations Report from Fire Department**

Chief Kujawa presented the August 2014 report from the Fire Department to be placed on file.

Rasmussen stated Sunday, September 7, 2014, the Fire Department is conducting a live training burn at 1807 Merrill Avenue and the committee is invited to come out and watch.

### **Communications**

Alfonso stated we had a prohibited dangerous dog hearing at circuit court to get the dog euthanized. The lessons learned is that it was \$164 filing fee; \$75 share of summons fee; the dog had to sit to allow the defendant dog owner to answer the petition, so it was in the Humane Society another 20 days at \$16 per day; and then another week until they finally scheduled the hearing. She stated she got an order for the owner to pay the city the costs of about \$1,000, but the individual may be judgment proof. She indicated she was trying to get some restitution for the victim through municipal court.

Melissa Dotter, of the Drug Free Communities Program, stated there were four upcoming events: 1) Annual Faces of Recovery Dinner, September 15, 2014; 2) Summit on Heroin, September 26, 2014; 3) AOD Partnership meeting on October 7, 2014; and 4) the Alcohol Policy Conference, October 9, 2014. She filed a packet of information on these events with the clerk. Rasmussen stated the Alcohol Policy Conference is a great opportunity to network among communities and partnership coalitions. It is in Green Bay this year at the Tundra Lodge.

### **Adjournment**

Motion by Wagner, second by Wagner to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 6:50 pm.

the bouncers shut the bar door after being asked a couple of times. This helped with some of the noise coming from the bar. The female bar employee wanted the information of the person who called in the complaints so she could file a harassment complaint. Officers advised the caller was not harassing anyone, and that the noise was too loud. Employee disagreed about the noise.

**Lumpy's Bar**, 265 Chellis St., Case #14-6412, 07-19-14 at 10:56pm: Officer responded to Lumpy's after having observed several Liquor on the Street violations and hearing loud music and yelling. Earlier in the evening, one of the department Community Service Officers advised they had seen approximately 10 patrons outside Lumpy's drinking from open containers. RE: Police Activity at It's Our Clubhouse Bar

Dear Public Health and Safety Committee Members,

The purpose of this communication is to provide further information regarding police responses to It's Our Clubhouse tavern located at 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. since its opening in June of this year. Specifically, I will detail conversations that I or other patrol supervisors have had with tavern owner, Mr. Bryan Morel. Additionally, I am including a document with a summary of each incident at the tavern since its opening.

**Conversation with Bryan Morel – 07-24-14**

I met with Mr. Morel, on 07-24-14 at approximately 7:40pm at his place of business at the direction of Chief Hardel. Officer Shawn Pierschalla was present as well. The purpose of our visit was to discuss recent activity there and how Mr. Morel felt his business was going and if there was anything that we could do to help him curb unwanted behavior. I had printed all service calls for the address of the business as talking points. The following items were discussed:

- Repeated noise complaints at the bar (3 at the time, since the bar had opened in mid-June)
- Suspicions of drug activity outside
- Mr. Morel's long-term plans for the business.

The tone of the conversation was positive. We explained our concerns to Mr. Morel, focusing initially on the noise complaints. He stated he believed there had been only two noise complaints, but the CAD printouts showed there had been three. We suggested the door to the business stay closed, however Mr. Morel seemed resistive to this. He stated he would not be able to keep as close an eye on the outside activities in the parking lot with the door closed. He also said that when the door is closed, people tend to block it by standing in front of it. When it was suggested that perhaps a window being installed in the door, Mr. Morel pointed out the cost associated with that. However, he later said he was interested in installing a large bay window in the east side of the building, facing S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. He pointed out this was more of a long-term goal.

Regarding the possible drug activity, Mr. Morel encouraged canine assisted officers to come to the business to conduct walk-throughs with the dog. This was a suggestion he has made to me in

the past, and I have already spoken to Officer Jordan about this. Officer Jordan pointed out some concerns with walking canine “Mabel” through a tavern crowded with people that have been drinking. We offered to Mr. Morel the option of having police canines conduct walk-throughs of the parking lot of the business. Mr. Morel seemed receptive to this idea.

Mr. Morel expressed his desire to eventually expand or evolve the business into having food items and seating for patrons wishing to eat.

The over-arching thought that Officer Pierschalla and I left with Mr. Morel was that we wanted his business to be successful and positive, but we needed compliance from him on the noise issues. He was advised that further noise complaints may very well result in the issuance of citations. Mr. Morel was responsive to this, and indicated that he was looking forward to a continued positive relationship with our department.

#### **Conversation with Bryan Morel – 08-17-14**

Officers had contact at It’s Our Clubhouse on 08-16-17, resulting in a citation for Disturbing the Peace being issued. Several officers were present and Mr. Morel was out of town, but berated the officers via speakerphone. I then had a conversation with Mr. Morel on Sunday evening.

At approximately 9:30pm on 08-17-14 I responded to the parking lot of Kohlman’s IGA at the request of Officer Phillips. Upon arrival, I recognized Mr. Morel, the owner of Its Our Clubhouse tavern. Officer Phillips advised me he and Officer Burkhardt had responded to the area to reissue a Disturbing the Peace citation that was issued to Bryan on 08-16-14 (case #14-7225). They had received direction to reissue the citation to the bartender that had been working that evening as Mr. Morel had not been present. Now, Mr. Morel was requesting the citation be issued to It’s Our Clubhouse LLC to avoid the negative impact for the bartender. Mr. Morel indicated that he would just pay the citation.

I then spoke with Mr. Morel for about 40 minutes. We spoke about the recent incidents at the tavern. He expressed his frustration and dissatisfaction with how officers have handled themselves. The tone of this conversation was greatly different from the previous conversation we had on 07-24-14.

Below are some of his concerns/complaints and my responses (in *italics*):

- He cited the incident from 08-16-14, and pointed out that there were 6 officers present in the parking lot of IGA. He regarded this as threatening behavior toward his patrons and could not understand that so many officers would respond to a noise complaint. *I advised him that I was not aware that any of his patrons were threatened. However, his bartender had expressed concern over the large crowd that evening, and advised that patrons were inside breaking glasses when she decided (on her own) to close about 30 minutes early. I explained that I expected our officers to be safe, and the report of a large intoxicated crowd would generate a large police response. I agreed that occasionally we may see multiple officers gather at an*



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*incident, and we will direct some to leave the scene if not needed. I am not convinced that was the case here. Mr. Morel stated he was fine with the police having one squad in the area as the bar was closing, etc. I expressed our desire to want to have a cooperative working relationship with him. However, I also frankly told him that I was not looking for his permission to police the area, and that we would take appropriate enforcement action when needed, even if that meant multiple officers.*

- *Officers were shouting racial comments at his patrons during the 08-16-14 incident from the parking lot at IGA.- This was the first I had heard of this, and asked Mr. Morel for specifics. He said an officer called from the IGA lot, “Who is that black guy?” or something similar. In the way Mr. Morel is described this, I regarded this as a physical descriptor to differentiate the male being referenced from surrounding “white guys” or “Asian guys.” A later reviewing of the squad video showed that an officer asked the bartender standing next to him, “who is that guy sticking his head out?” This was due to the DJ poking his head out of the door to the tavern and videotaping the officers.*
- *“Perception is everything.” - Mr. Morel stated that perception is everything and that the perception police were giving by a large presence on 08-16-14 was threatening. I stated that I agreed to a large degree about the weight of perception in matters. For example, I told him that the perception the people that live in the area may have is that the neighborhood has seriously deteriorated due to the tavern’s opening. I advised him that we are trying/wanting to change perceptions by working with him and his business as opposed to having an adversarial relationship. However, he has made that somewhat difficult with recent comments, etc.*
- *Noise complaints may be called in by other jealous taverns or disgruntled employees. - This suggestion was made by Mr. Morel, but I didn’t have all the reporting party information for each incident. I did look up the reporting party info for the 08-16-14 incident and saw that it was a named citizen who lives in the area that had called.*
- *Officer responding on 08-09-14 was disrespectful and unprofessional. Officer implied that overserving was the cause for the problems. Mr. Morel stated that he was tending bar that evening and was cutting people off and patrons were drinking water. - I think Mr. Morel was offended by this suggestion, but this was the evening that patrons could reportedly purchase a \$10.00 All-You-Can-Drink wristband. I did explain that officers are human and may not always explain everything in the way that will please everyone. In reviewing some of the available squad video, I did not hear any officer comments that sounded disrespectful or antagonistic.*
- *Officers are not welcome on the property except for police business. - I pointed out that official police business is the only reason we would be on his property. He seemed to categorize the meeting Officer Pierschalla and I had with him at his tavern on 07-24-14 as not official business. I pointed out that we had met him under the direction of the Chief of police at the request of the PH&S committee. I advised him he may need to express his concern with that committee if he felt our meeting was unnecessary.*

There were several other items discussed as well. I told Mr. Morel that while I certainly disagree with him on several points, I appreciated the fact that he and I have been able to have respectful conversations. He told me he would need copies of all police reports from the incidents at the tavern. I advised him that he would need to request those copies at the police department.

I later reviewed squad video (#516) of the 08-16-14 incident and it shows a large crowd that staff did not seem to have control of. Video starts at 1:25:20 am. Numerous patrons were sitting on the front porch of 728 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. and more than two dozen others were standing around outside. Highlights from the video are below:

- 1:43:00 – Officers have parked their squads in the IGA parking lot with cameras facing It's Our Clubhouse. Officers worked to resolve parking issue and being interacting with large crowd outside.
- 1:46:30 – Contact is made with one of the bartenders, and she states “he left me in charge all weekend, and I don't know what...I'm about to have a breakdown.”
- 2:01:10 – Officers had gone back to the IGA parking lot when the bartender crosses the street to speak with officers. She advises she is “closing 'er down right now” and “nobody is listening to me about leaving” and “you guys might want to stick around” and “glass is getting broke all over.”
- 2:05:55 – Bartender comes back over to IGA lot on the phone, presumably with Mr. Morel. She asks if Officer Pettigrew is working.
- 2:06:40 – Officer Pierschalla asks the bartender who “the guy sticking his head out” of the door to the bar was. He was observed videotaping the officers. This may be the comment that Mr. Morel complained was “racist,” as he reported the officer had shouted something about a “black guy.” The video showed this was not the case.
- 2:07:10 – The second bartender leaves the building and approaches the street as if she was going to cross to the IGA as well. The first bartender tells her to get back inside the bar as nobody was in there with all the patrons still inside. Officers were waiting in the IGA lot at this time at the bartender's request for Mr. Morel to call her back.
- 2:08:35 – Bartender says she told Mr. Morel he needs more bartenders.
- 2:10:20 – Officer Phillips had spoken with Mr. Morel by telephone, and advises that Mr. Morel told him the bartender said that the police were making her close the bar. Her previous comments on the video showed this was not the case.

#### **Lt. Heindel's conversation with Mr. Morel – 08-30-14**

I received an email from Lt. Heindel on 08-30-14 detailing a conversation he had with Mr. Morel following the issuance of a Disturbing the Peace citation that had been issued to It's Our Clubhouse LLC (case #14-7702). Lt. Heindel reported the following:

On 08-30-14 at about 00:06 hours officers responded to It's Our Clubhouse for a noise complaint. The reporting individual was anonymous. The complainant reported that music was booming from It's Our Clubhouse louder than usual. When Officers Burkhardt and Chittum arrived they agreed that the music volume was excessive. Mr. Morel demanded to speak with the supervisor. Lt. Heindel was on the way over as soon as he heard the call come in. He spoke with Mr. Morel. Mr. Morel explained that the volume of the music has not changed all night. It was



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explained that the officers could hear it a block away. Mr. Morel mentioned that he and Lt. Heindel were having a normal conversation outside the bar. We did not have to raise our voices so the music was not excessive. Lt. Heindel replied that it was not at that time, but when the officers heard it was. Mr. Morel asked if the police department had a decibel meter. Lt. Heindel advised him that we do not use a decibel meter. He questioningly replied, "so, then it's subjective." Lt. Heindel replied that the officers make the determination. Mr. Morel reiterated that we are not allowed on his property. Lt. Heindel stood on the sidewalk as Mr. Morel stood in the driveway. Mr. Morel continued that night shift group B was not allowed on his property. The other shift (group A) can come onto his property. Mr. Morel said that night shift group B is the only shift he has problems with. He said he does not have problems with the other shift (group A). It's Our Clubhouse LLC was issued a Disturbing the Peace citation. As officers were leaving, Mr. Morel was walking down the road recording them on his phone.

### **Conclusion**

I believe two recent incidents are representative of the current state of affairs. The first occurred on 08-21-14 (event #140099049). This incident documents a noise complaint to which officers were dispatched regarding a group of males outside It's Our Clubhouse using foul language. Officer Burkhardt noted that the males were gone upon his arrival. He noted that he made contact with Mr. Morel as a courtesy to advise him of the complaint, but confirmed that no enforcement action was being taken against the business. Mr. Morel expressed that he felt that Office Burkhardt contacting him at the business was inappropriate, and that he had no business in the bar. The second incident occurred on 08-19-14 (case #14-7334). In this incident Mr. Morel reported suspicious drug activity at the tavern, in which a patron offered prescription drugs to Mr. Morel's bartenders. Officer Pettigrew responded and seized the drugs. They were later identified as CNS stimulants. Mr. Morel would not identify the patron, nor was he willing to turn over the video surveillance footage of the incident. He cited the fact that the patron also happens to be one of his vendors. He indicated he did not want to upset this person, causing them to pull products from Mr. Morel's business. However, Mr. Morel said if the suspect commits this act in his bar again, he would not hesitate to give the police his information. This type of behavior from Mr. Morel hinders law enforcement efforts to address the very concerns he has raised since our earliest conversations, namely that of drug use and transactions occurring on his property.

The incidents at It's Our Clubhouse, and the conversations with Mr. Morel seem to demonstrate an eroding relationship between him and the police department, and also an unwillingness on his part to address areas of concern that have been brought to his attention.

# It's Our Clubhouse – Incidents through 09-02-14

The below information documents 24 incidents reported to and/or responded to by the Wausau Police Department at Its It's Our Clubhouse tavern at 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. since June 19<sup>th</sup>, 2014. The following categories of incidents and their frequency of occurrence are as follows:

- **Complaints involving noise issues** – 11 incidents, resulting in multiple verbal warnings, 1 written warning, two written citations, and a couple of instances in which the complaint was unable to be substantiated or believed by officers to be unfounded.
- **Complaints involving drug activity or suspected drug activity** – 4 incidents, including an attempted traffic stop resulting in a brief vehicle pursuit in the city. CNS Stimulant prescription medication was also confiscated in another incident. Additional information was forwarded to the Special Investigation Unit.
- **Complaints involving fights or other disturbances** – 7 incidents. This number is an approximation, as during two of the incidents officers reported multiple altercations occurring while officers were on scene. Two informational reports were completed, and one Disorderly Conduct citation was issued. Additionally, one arrest for Disorderly Conduct was made.
- **Extra patrol requests and miscellaneous activity** – One request for extra patrol was made by a nearby resident regarding damage to their fence believed to be made by tavern patrons. Also, a homeless female was conveyed to an area motel after she was located outside the tavern seeking assistance.

Please refer incident summaries below for additional information.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Case #14-5437, 06-19-14 at 12:35am: Officers were dispatched to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of very loud music. Officers met with the owner who turned down the music and stated he wanted to work with the PD. He was advised to keep the doors closed, but he stated it was the only way he could monitor activity outside the tavern. He turned the music down to a tolerable level, but kept the doors open. A written warning for Disturbing the Peace was issued.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Event #140073636, 06-26-14 at 1:40am: Officers were dispatched to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of loud voices/talking. Officers met with the bartender. She was closing up, and was advised to keep the doors closed to minimize the noise level.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Event #140078285, 07-06-14 at 1:38am: Officers were dispatched to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of two people possibly smoking marijuana inside a vehicle in the parking lot. The vehicle left prior to officer arrival, but was located several blocks away. Officer initiated traffic stop for moving violation. Vehicle then fled, resulting in brief pursuit. The vehicle was traveling at a high rate of speed and disregarding traffic control. Pursuit was ended. It was learned that the vehicle had been rented on 07-04-14 from Central Wisconsin Airport by a female from Weston. Investigation continues.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave., Event #140078291, 07-06-14 at 2:03am: Officer was dispatched to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of loud music. Officer met with the owner who advised he had already explained to a patrol lieutenant why he was keeping the doors open. The noise was not excessive, and the doors were shut upon request.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140087268, 07-26-14 at 12:33am: Officer responded for a report of loud music and voices. Officer noted that the door was open and the music was very loud. Officer spoke with bouncer and explained that the door needed to remain closed. After the door was closed the noise was muffled.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-6672, 07-28-14 at 12:59am: Owner of Clubhouse reported that a patron approached him and asked him if he wanted to "buy some rock." Officer conducted a consent search of patron, and no contraband was located. Patron was asked to leave the bar and told not to return, per the owner. He said he understood.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140088967, 07-30-14 at 2:10am: Officers responded for a report of loud noise. The bar was closed and three males were sitting outside waiting for a taxi. There was no further problem.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140090363, 08-02-14 at 12:23am: Officers were dispatch for a 911 call, in which a female caller stated they needed officers before hanging up. Further information provided was that a fight almost broke out there and the music was too loud. Contact was made with bouncer who stated there had been a male there acting obnoxious and refusing to leave. Bouncer was also advised to keep the door shut.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140090403, 08-02-14 at 2:30: Officer responded to a complaint of loud vehicles and people leaving the area of It's Our Clubhouse at closing time. Area had mostly cleared out by the time officers arrived. Contact was made with bartender and bouncer regarding the matter.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140091749, 08-04-14 at 11:34pm: Officers responded for a report of a patron threatening the bartender and/or bar owner. Officer comments are as follows: "Spoke to bartender and he stated that the male came up to a different patron and stated that he put stuff on his truck.. the bartender approached him and told him to leave and the guy had a cue ball in his hand... the male gave it to the bartender and walked out of the door...nothing further at this time...3121." And "Made contact with the male party on S. 5th Ave/West St. who advised the owner of the bar got mad at him because he was speaking with a blonde female who caught his attention. The male party advised the owner got jealous, got in his face making derogatory comments, so he made comments back. The male party advised nothing physical happened between he and the owner and he left to avoid additional issues. Officers spoke with the owner of It's Our Clubhouse, who advised the male party was not welcome back at his business. This was explained to the male party who advised he didn't plan on coming back to the bar. Male party was released from the scene. The bar owner advised he did not want to pursue charges from this incident."

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140092189, 08-06-14 at 12:07am: Officer made contact with It's Our Clubhouse bar owner regarding a complaint of profanity from patrons outside the bar. He advised he would try to contain the situation.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7027, 08-09-14 at 1:28am: Officers were dispatched to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of a possible domestic disturbance. A bouncer from It's Our Clubhouse chased after a male that been asked to leave the bar following an altercation he had with a female. The intoxicated female was located at the bar and was eventually cited for Disorderly Conduct due to her behavior. The male and bouncer were located near KFC and the male was arrested for Domestic Disorderly Conduct.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7028, 08-09-14 at 2:51am: Officers on scene for the above-cited incident at It's Our Clubhouse reported witnessing multiple fights at the bar requiring numerous officers. Officers observed three other fights in the vicinity to the bar. One fight was observed outside the north side entrance to the bar. A female party had a seizure after the altercation and had to be taken to Aspirus by ambulance. Officers then observed two additional fights starting across the street from the bar in Kohlman's parking lot, while other officers were tending to the female party having a seizure. No arrests were made from the incidents due to officers stopping physical altercations from taking place. The parties involved in all three fights were patrons at It's Our Clubhouse bar. The owner Bryan Morel was warned about his bartenders over serving their patrons and about the commotion happening because of his bar. On this night, the bar had all you can drink rail drinks for \$10.00. A total of (6) officers had to respond to It's Our Clubhouse between 0129hrs and 0251hrs. Informational report was completed.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7225, 08-16-14 at 1:25am: Offices responded to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of loud noise, people screaming, and patrons parking in the parking spots of building tenants next door. Officers took time to locate the owners of the vehicles from inside It's Our Clubhouse to have the vehicles removed (instead of ticketing the vehicles). .

The bouncer stated the owner was out of town, and the only people working there were two bartenders and him. He said it was too much work for him to manage all the people

Officers talked to one of the bartenders, who stated she was one of the two bartenders working. She talked to the owner about only having three staff on hand and said it would not be enough. She asked an officer if she needed to close down early and was told no.

Officer spoke with the owner using the bartender's phone. After contact with the bartender concluded, officers walked across S. 3rd Avenue to the parking lot of Kohlman's Grocery. The bartender came across street and said the owner was on the phone and wanted to talk to officers, she the phone was in speaker mode. Owner told officers that police were banned from his property and to stay off his property.

Disturbing the Peace citation was issued to It's Our Clubhouse LLC.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140098086 and Case #14-7334, 08-19-14 at 10:11pm: Officer initially responded to It's Our Clubhouse to speak with the owner about his concerns about drug activity in the bar. The owner later called back to report that one of his patrons entered the bar and

offered the bartenders some pills. The pills were turned over to the officer. The medications included 2 capsules of M. Amphet Salts 10mg (CNS Stimulant) and 3 tablets of M. Amphet Salts 10mg (CNS Stimulant). Both bartenders provided written statements regarding the incident, however, the owner said he would not give officers the name of the suspect who offered and exchanged illegal prescription medications within his bar, nor would he release the video footage showing the exchange. The owner said the suspect is a vendor of his who is responsible for supplying numerous products to his business, including, but not limited to: his jukebox, pool table, gambling machines, etc. The owner said he does not want to risk the suspect becoming upset and pulling his product from his business. However, the owner said if the suspect commits this act in his bar again, he would not hesitate to give the police his information.

Due to lack of suspect information, and cooperation from the reporting party, a report was completed for informational purposes only.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140099049, 08-21-14 at 10:18pm: Officers responded to It's Our Clubhouse for a report of a group of males outside the business using foul language. The anonymous reporting party had advised that they did not want their children to hear that kind of language. Upon officer arrival, the males were no longer outside. Officers described contacting the owner as a courtesy to advise him of the complaint, and confirmed that no enforcement action was being taken. The owner advised the officers that contacting him at the bar was inappropriate, and they had no reason to be in his bar.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7461, 08-23-14 at 2:24am: Officer on patrol observed an altercation taking place on West St. next to It's Our Clubhouse involving approximately 6 individuals. It was eventually determined that these were patrons from the tavern. Additional officers were requested to assist with the large, unruly crowd that was in the parking lot and property to the southwest of the tavern. Squad video of one unit's response showed dozens of people milling about in the parking lot. As officers attempted to regain control of the situation, they directed the crowd to disperse. This went on for several minutes, as many individuals seemed reluctant to comply. It was reported that the owner, who was present inside the bar and also observed by officers outside amongst these individuals in the parking lot, neglected to assist officers with removing these individuals from his property.

In total, (7) Wausau PD Officers and (1) Sheriff Deputy had to respond to Its It's Our Clubhouse to assist with the altercation and help calm the situation down. Officers did not arrest any individuals in reference to this incident due to the parties involved being uncooperative. Officers were also distracted by unruly patrons who refused to calm down and or cooperate with Officers; therefore, allowing possible suspects to leave the scene unnoticed. Officers were out-numbered during this incident.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140099949, 08-23-14 at 10:43pm: Officers responded for a report of two females creating a disturbance in the parking lot. It was discovered that one of the females was a bartender from the tavern. The owner had just fired her this evening. She was upset, and the other female was trying to calm her down. Both were warned about the noise level. The fired employee went to her nearby residence before officers left, and the other female went inside the tavern.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, event #140099973, 08-23-14 at 11:57pm: Officer responded to the tavern for a report of loud music when the door is opened and a loud crowd outside. When the officer drove past the business the door was closed. Officer only observed the door being opened when patrons were exiting to smoke outside. The noise was reportedly not loud enough or of sufficient duration to be considered for enforcement action.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Case #14-7461, 08-23-14 at 2:24am: Officers were dispatched for a report of possible family disturbance inside a vehicle parked in the lot at the tavern. Investigation showed that a male and female were having a verbal argument. They advised that their children were involved in the recent rollover traffic crash outside of Wausau, and they have experienced stress from this. The female advised she was fine, and she was waiting for a friend to take her home. Both individuals were advised to keep the noise down. They indicated they would.

**It's Our Clubhouse**, 738 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave, Event #140102178, 08-29-14 at 12:32am: Dispatch received information regarding possible drug activity in a vehicle at the tavern. A plate number was provided, including information that two males in the vehicle were talking with patrons in the tavern about drugs they have. An additional vehicle was described as being en route to the area to purchase drugs. The plate number provided did not match any vehicle. ATL (Attempt To Locate) was given out on multiple law enforcement radio frequencies, and an email was sent to the Special Investigations Unit. No officer was dispatched to the tavern.




