Public Comment on matters appearing on the agenda.

Minutes of previous meeting(s) (8/18/14 & 9/04/14)

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the minutes of the previous meetings (8/18/14 & 9/04/14). Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion with premises owner, Bryan Morel, about management issues and police call volume identified at Its Our Clubhouse tavern and possible action thereon.

Rasmussen stated the committee has become concerned with the police call volume to It's Our Clubhouse. She informed Mr. Morel that they would not discuss the details of specific incidents that occurred at his establishment unless he requested that they do so. Furthermore, as we enter into the discussion of those details, they become a part of the record that could be used in future hearings. She questioned if he was willing to discuss incidents to date and Morel responded that he was willing.

Chief Hardel indicated he spoke with Mr. Morel twice on the phone last week and requested that he come to City Hall to obtain copies of the reports that were provided to the committee. Hardel indicated Mr. Morel now has the same police report documentation that the committee has reviewed and he would let that stand on its own rather than going into detail. Hardel felt it was very clear that Mr. Morel has displayed a lack of cooperation with police; he has a lack of desire to be a good neighbor; and he is mismanaging the tavern. He requested the Public Health & Safety Committee to re-evaluate the issuance of the liquor license to Mr. Morel.

Rasmussen pointed out at the initial Liquor License Review Subcommittee meeting at which his license application was considered, Morel was told the clientele in the premises he was establishing would certainly need management control. She questioned if he had a plan moving forward to address the issues shown in the reports.

Bryan Morel stated that he has asked for police assistance and has requested not only the drug dogs to come through the premises, but also undercover officers, but he did not believe that has happened. He acknowledged there were a few incidents where his interaction with officers could have been better, but we all have bad days and he was willing to apologize to the officers for his attitude. He indicated they have done some things to alleviate the noise complaints; they have been closing the doors instead of leaving them open at night. There were picnic tables on the north side of the building for people who went out to smoke and they have now moved them to the south side of the building. He indicated he planned to enclose the wheelchair ramp with canvas type walls that would roll up to keep noise in and people from going out to the parking lot to smoke. He stated they are looking to reopen the kitchen and begin serving food in a few weeks which he felt would help facilitate changing the type of clientele.

Rasmussen requested Morel address the number of fights that have been taking place, which on a couple of occasions took a large response from the Police Department and on one occasion even additional help from the Sheriff's Department. Morel stated the incident with the involvement of the Sheriff's Department didn't take place on his property, it was across the street in Kohlman's parking lot. He reiterated that he himself has called police for help. Rasmussen pointed out he refused to name a known individual who offered him drugs in the bar and refused to turn over the video. Morel indicated the individual was one of the vendors of his establishment and he didn't want to lose his business. He stated he still had the video and would turn it over if subpoenaed to do so. Wagner expressed frustration over Morel's resistance to providing information and disrespectful attitude with police.

Hardel pointed out Lt. Baeten referred to 24 incidents in the report to the committee, however, he just put down "noteworthy" incidents; there were actually 47 calls to the bar overall, which has only been open 90 days. He noted Morel has repeatedly told officers they are not welcome on his property. He noted officers have been there on approximately 11 noise complaints, most of which the doors were open and Morel did not want to close them. Patrons were going outside with their drinks and in one incident the bartender said she couldn't control the crowd or prevent them from taking drinks outside, so Morel was called and agreed to close the bar down for the night.

Neal commented about over-serving in reference to the bar's \$10 all you can drink rail special, and provided suggestions for patron management. Hardel indicated they had squad videos of activity outside the bar.

Rasmussen questioned what the recommendation of the Police Department was. Hardel stated there was 100 demerit points against the license, but he pointed out there should have actually been other citations. The department was very willing to work with Morel early on and there were a number of noise complaints that were validated where he received only verbal warnings. He has two documented citations for disturbing the peace. He recommended the liquor license be re-evaluated based on the activity they have seen and the reports provided. Rasmussen stated the committee could consider a limited term suspension, not necessarily a revocation. In some other cases suspensions have worked to address the issues and have had some impact.

Wagner felt he should be given some time off to get with the professionals and put a plan in place that specifies how he is going change his management and bartender culture; how to anticipate and control the crowd; and how to police and control the exterior of his building.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to move to a suspension hearing and for Morel to come to the hearing with a written plan to be responsible bar owner and manager. Motion carried 5-0.

Consider Wausau Police Department's proposal in response to the Wausau School District's Council presentation.

Hardel indicated he met with the school district four separate times to discuss how they could provide a better safety net for the schools. He presented a proposal to them and the school district unanimously approved it, as well as the school board; it is now moving to a funding stage. He indicated he also presented it the city Human Resources Committee and it was approved.

Hardel explained the plan is to expand our SRO (School Resources Officer) program. Currently there are three SRO's; one at Wausau East HS, one at Wausau West HS and the middle schools share one position. There has not been a SRO program for the elementary schools. He noted service calls to the elementary schools in the last couple years has gone up dramatically. He proposed expanding the SRO program to have one dedicated SRO for Horace Mann Middle School and all of the elementary schools on the east side of the river, and one SRO dedicated for John Muir Middle School and all of the elementary schools on the west side. There would be a schedule where they would be attending those grade schools throughout the week, meeting with the principal and any other staff that might have information. He felt it was imperative for the schools to continue to have that educational component from the police department. Hardel indicated he is requesting the position be split financially, 50% by the school district and 50% by the city. The other component in this proposal is a Neighborhood/Community Resource Officer to work in concert with the SRO's. He explained if the SRO's and a particular school identify problem houses or problem individuals and can't address all of their needs, then they would pass it to the Neighborhood Officer to pick up and address. He indicated they have approached the Alexander Foundation for funding of this additional position, which has agreed to fund it 100% for a year contingent upon the city and school district funding the other position.

Consider various license applications.

Rasmussen stated all licenses on the list are recommended for approval and one special event application.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to approve licenses as recommended. Motion carried 5-0.

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Chief Hardel presented the Tavern Report from August 4, 2014 thru September 4, 2014. (*See attached report.*)

Chief Kujawa presented the Fire Department report for August. No discussion; report placed on file.

Rayala stated since the Pet Fancier Permit was approved by Council the application has been set up and there have been several inquiries. Rasmussen noted the city newsletter will contain an article on the new permit as well.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 6:17 pm.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Applications as listed have or will have a background check run by staff and reviewed by the Police Chief or his designee. Applications marked pending will have a status update at the meeting. In accordance with city ordinance, **all permits approved are held for debts owed to the city until the debt is paid in full.**

1. The application of Shawn Bauer, for a Public Transport Driver, has received a denial recommendation per Chief Hardel due to a lengthy record, including felony convictions and three OWI convictions.
2. Lil' Ole Winemaker Shoppe, LLC has applied for a Class B Beer license to add to their premises at 602 Jefferson Street. They currently hold a Class B Liquor -Wine only (they cannot serve any hard liquor) license permitted for wineries. The Dept. of Justice informed us at our conference that they now allow wineries to also hold a Class B Beer license.
3. Hmong Eggrolls, LLC, has applied for a Class B Beer license for their premise located at 1040 S. 10th Avenue, Wausau
4. There are three applications for Pet Fancier Permits (attached). Background checks were conducted for animal cruelty or violations of the animal code; none were found.
5. Downtown Grocery.Com, LLC is renewing for a Sidewalk Café relative to their four outside tables. They have a Class A license and do not serve alcohol.
6. Class I Special Event applications from Wausau Area Events for the annual Holiday Parade on December 5, 2014; and Eastbay (with Capture Marketing LLC) for the 2014 Eastbay Turkey Trot, on Thanksgiving Day.

Inspections & Property Violation Charts

Our additional property inspector started at the end of March. It has really made a difference in the number of violations we have found and the number of follow ups that staff has completed. We have exceeded our total number of complaints, violations, and enforcement actions in the first 9 months this year than we did all of 2013.

Table 3 now includes weed notices sent since our department took on that program this spring. We have sent out 552 notices through September (approximately 400 were sent last year total). We have provide a better service to our residents.

Community Service Officer - Property Maintenance Program

At the end of August, most of our CSO's returned to college. Now we usually have 3 days a week that a CSO is available to follow up on complaints. This corresponds with a lower number of complaints we receive at this time of year.

Over the first half of summer the CSO's worked to educate our residents on municipal codes and how they related to the upkeep of their property. The program also helped to free up our property inspectors for other major property concerns such as no power, major structural concerns, and interior inspections. One surprising bit of feedback is that the CSOs estimated they made contact with the residents only 10-15% of the time. Staff will be reviewing the program and tweaking to make improvements.

Implementation of Rental Licensing and Inspection

The Apartment Association lawsuit is still pending. We should be receiving a circuit court decision soon.

Should this be the direction the city pursues, the 2015 HSMC contract gives us much more time to plan for the in-house animal care operation for the year of 2016. I have advised Lt. Barnes to contact the HSMC to pursue a 2015 contract. Please advise if you have questions. Thank you.

Dear Ms. Rasmussen and Committee Members,

On September 10th, 2014, I attended the Health and Safety Committee meeting dealing with Trap/Neuter/Release of feral & stray cats. I am the retired manager of the Humane Society of Marathon County and a Wausau property owner so I have multiple interests in this topic. What I experienced was a presentation by DVM Susan Krebsbach which was more suited to a warm fuzzy fundraising event than to a committee and community seeking usable, practical information. Following are some topics that most concerned me:

Lack of rabies boosters in colonies: It's disturbing to hear a veterinary professional casually minimize the need for an ongoing colony booster program against a fatal disease. If we take on faith Ms. Krebsbach's comment that contraction of rabies by a human is more likely to happen through a wild animal than a cat, it can be argued that this is likely the result of a significant number of cat owners rabies vaccinating and boosting their pets through the licensing process. Standards set up to support human safety should not be sacrificed to accommodate a TNR program or any animal agenda. Human safety must always supersede any animal consideration. The inability of TNR to provide booster monitoring is a major failure and, on its own, should be reason enough to remove the program from consideration.

Leash Laws: Any requests for the loosening or abandonment of leash laws should be concerning to everyone. Pets running at large are not only a human safety concern but are the absolute root of the stray issue. Unsterilized pets at large are the biggest factor in the pet over-population problem and are the genesis of what often becomes the feral animal. No community has enough manpower or money to enforce leash laws 100%. However, all laws/ordinances announce the expectation of behavior and, in time, that behavior becomes the goal norm in a society. For Ms. Krebsbach to ask for the suspension of leash laws not only brushes aside a concern for community safety, but it ironically and directly exacerbates the very problem she claims so desperately to want to solve.....the stray/feral cat population. I would ask the panel to leave current leash laws in place as well as ordinances limiting the number of pets per household.

Blurring of the terms "stray" and "feral": The euphemism "community cat" was used in this meeting to blend strays and ferals together. Here again is one of those warm fuzzy fund raising tools, but in fact the panel needs to focus on the very real difference between these subsets of cats. Strays are lost or abandoned household pets. They lived in homes. They are people acclimated. Even though they may be initially frightened when put into a shelter situation, the vast majority of strays quickly adapt and can be considered for adoption. The feral cat is a wild animal....period. It may be generations away from human contact, making it hostile and highly dangerous. In a shelter situation ferals put staff, volunteers and the public at great risk. Ferals are easily and quickly distinguished from strays by their much-exaggerated hostile behavior. Had the committee been shown movies of true ferals vs. strays, rather than photos, you would quickly have become experts in the distinguishing process. True ferals bring absolutely no redeeming qualities to the community and, barring any reported bite issues, need to be humanely euthanized upon identification.

State mandated stray holding period: Wisconsin requires a 7 day holding period for animals found at large. The main purpose of this period is to allow “owned” pets (strays) to be reclaimed by their families before any disposition action by the holding organization. Ferals are not “owned” and there are no families looking to reclaim them. Early on in my management of our humane society I had a discussion regarding the holding of ferals with the former State Veterinarian, Dr. Bulay. The discussion was generated by my concern for staff welfare when taking in obviously feral cats. The outcome of that discussion was that the shelter had the discretion to euthanize any animal (regardless of its holding period status) in order to insure human safety. I would ask the panel to enlist corporate council to contact the State Veterinarian or other state legal offices to better understand the discretionary power of the humane society regarding the extended holding of any animal, but especially the ferals. If true ferals are being held at HSMC, then staff is at risk and costs are elevated for no rational purpose.

Impact of TNR on rural municipal neighbors: At the outset of the committee meeting there were many comments stressing the return of TNR cats to their original location. I began to wonder how one ended up with colonies if cats were actually being returned one by one to an endless number of individual sites. Then it was finally revealed that, in spite of significant program longevity, Friends of Ferals has apparently not been able to implement TNR in urban Madison. Most of the blame for that seemed to be laid on those pesky leash laws but it’s easy to suspect that neighborhood resistance is a much larger factor. Apparently when met with urban resistance, the program fall back is to then establish rural colonies. Knowing personally that countless numbers of unwanted pets are already being dumped into rural areas, causing many problems for those municipalities, I wonder how happy nearby rural townships would be to learn that Wausau promotes TNR, which would eventually add to their unwanted animal burden. I would ask the committee to consider this factor in its discussions.

The role of the Humane Society of Marathon County: The major components of any humane society’s responsibility includes (1)protecting the public from dangerous animals and (2)enhancing the quality of life for adoptable pets by placing them into loving, protective homes. TNR programs do neither of the above. A humane society is side stepping its responsibility when it collaborates with programs that release unwanted animals back into the community to live lives that are only minimally better than the stray existence they previously led. In the case of household cats surrendered to a shelter and then moved into a TNR program, their quality of life in a colony is actually drastically reduced from their previous home existence.

It was made clear that our humane society initiated the topic of TNR and solicited Dr. Krebsbach’s presentation. The management of HSMC stressed the impact of stray and feral holding on its budget and is trying to garner the support of TNR by Wausau based on cost savings. I’m not familiar with the nuances of HSMC’s contract with Wausau, however as a taxpayer and with my employment experience at HSMC, I’m wondering if the shelter doesn’t have its own agenda in this matter. Myself and other observers believe that HSMC is quietly

striving to be a no-kill facility. What better way to scale back shelter costs and euthanasia numbers than to take animals you can't adopt, make them the responsibility of a group of volunteers unconnected to shelter funding, so that group can then put those cats right back into the community where they were just deemed unwanted or a nuisance? And all under the guise of some benevolent program.

Animal welfare mentality: Unfortunately, the September 10th presentation was an example of a growing animal welfare mind set – “save every animal at any cost”. The American Humane Society estimates that there are 45 cats and 15 dogs born for every person in the United States. Even the Friends of Ferals own statistics of homeless cats are staggering. It's obvious that at this point in time there will not be a happy ending for all these creatures and yet some individuals and groups are not able to come to grips with this reality. These are the presenters who would offer the *illusion* of a solution but whose plan is not compatible with the realistic needs of the human community. The illusion is what Friends of Ferals and HSMC offered up on September 10th: In so doing, they are asking the City Council to ignore:

- * that lack of rabies boosters may (1) put your human population at risk and (2) is legally required of other pet guardians and owners
- *that allowing cat colonies might further encourage hoarding. FOF simplistically suggests that hoarders be turned over to social services or, better yet, asked to volunteer in TNR, giving hoarders unlimited access to fuel for their complicated compulsion
- *that abandoning leash laws is counterproductive and would almost certainly increase the number of animals at large in the community
- *that cats at large have a huge negative impact on the native song bird and small animal populations
- *those tax payers who insist upon the right to have their property free of feline trespassers – surely they will adjust their attitude if you just "be the hero" and “educate” them
- *that Marathon County does not have large vet schools from which to draw trained volunteers
- *that local vets may not be lining up to volunteer surgery services because the low cost spay/neuter group being brought in by HSMC has already negatively impacted their clinic earnings
- *that Friends of Ferals can't offer the committee a success model in a demographic similar to Wausau
- *that the glowing success stories offered up were communities in warm climates and that Wisconsin cat colonies would be inhumanely exposed to long, brutal Midwest winters.
- *the inconvenient fact that all national animal welfare groups bend over backwards to stress that cats belong indoors for their own quality of life and to prevent their various negative impacts on the community
- *the gentleman who unwittingly testified in the meeting to the fact that outdoor feeding of cats actually draws more cats to an area

The “save every animal at any cost” mentality is so focused on the animal end of the equation that there can be almost complete denial regarding the needs and well being of the human community. At its extreme, the drive to avoid euthanasia will even overlook quality of life

issues for the animal that is “saved”. It can be argued that TNR is not humane. Cats in such programs are still susceptible to the elements, injury, predation, disease and human cruelty. The life of an outdoor cat is shortened, miserable and filled with danger, especially in cold climates. This fact is highlighted by Dr. Krebsbach’s own story of panic when her cat was stray for only a few days.

I am strongly opposed to TNR and nothing I heard on September 10th changed my mind. I found the presentation to be at times naively simplistic, evasive and misleading. My hope is that the committee will connect with community leaders who have had firsthand experience with TNR rather than accept on faith the pie in the sky promotion by Dr. Krebsbach and HSMC leadership.

As an alternative to TNR, it might be a useful exercise to survey the concept of Wausau providing low cost spay/neuter clinics for its residents.

At its core, TNR is counterintuitive. It asks a community to invest in taking unwanted animals off the streets and then, after a short turn around period, to return them to that same status....at large and unowned.




