PUBLIC HEALTH & SAFETY COMMITTEE

Minutes of previous meeting(s) (2/16/15)

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the minutes of the previous meeting (2/16/15). Motion carried 5-0.

Consider various license applications.

Rasmussen stated all of the special event applications for Wausau Events 2015 season were in the packets. She indicated the Event for Equality is being pulled out and deferred to the April meeting as the organizer was unable to attend this meeting.

Rasmussen stated Amber Piette's application for an Operator's License was recommended for denial by Chief Hardel; it was noted Amber was not present to address the committee.

Motion by Wagner, second by Neal to approve or deny the various licenses as recommended by staff. Motion carried 5-0.

Consider bids submitted for new Refuse & Recycling Contract to be effective 1/1/2016, and take action regarding recommendations to Council on selection of contractor and various options contained in the bids including: term of contract; manual v. automated collection; and, selection and ownership of carts for refuse and recycling.

Maryanne Groat, Finance Director, explained they looked at maintaining our existing level of service to all residential properties, including multi-family units, totaling 16,633 units; or to go to an automated system, which would only include multi-family units of up to four, totaling 14,483 units. They took quotes for these two levels of services, looking at a variety of cart sizes and all of the other ancillary services that we may need, such as yard waste pickup, large item pickup for a cost, as well as providing extra carts for those that want them and spring cleanup. A pre-bid conference was conducted with all of the interested parties and pre-qualifications were required. The Board of Public Works pre-qualified Advance Disposal, Waste Management, Eagle Recycling, and Harter's Fox Valley Disposal. She indicated Harter's was the low bid. Under the current quotes in the first year the lowest proposal for manual service would save us \$105,000; under the automated with the contractor owning the carts, the savings would be \$172,000 in the five year contract. She recommended going with Harter's with the 10 year contract and to have the contractor own the carts, which would save the city from having to purchase, maintain and track them.

Rasmussen stated the committee needs to decide what level of service to provide to residents, whether remain manual or go to an automated system.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve an automated carted system with the contractor owning the carts. Motion carried 5-0.

Rasmussen stated the next decision was to select a contractor and decide the optimal length of the contract. She noted the options were for 5 years, 7 years, or 10 years. Neal commented 10 years was a long commitment should we have any issues with the contractor. Wagner felt it was important to lock in long range relationships and the 10 year contract also comes with extra savings.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve awarding the contract to the lowest bidder, Harter's Fox Valley Disposal for a 10 year term; and to authorize a budget of \$15,000 for staff to use for public education and outreach. Motion carried 5-0.

Ordinance Amending Section 8.08.011 Keeping of honey bees, regarding waiver of requirements.

Rasmussen stated this would allow Humane Office Bishop to work with homeowners for waivers when it is practical to do so. Alfonso stated upon written request they can decide on a case by case basis to grant a waiver of certain restrictions.

Motion by Wagner, second by Neal to approve the amendment to 8.08.011 Keep of honey bees. Motion carried 5-0.

Application for Apiary (Beekeeper) Permit with request for variance.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to approve the request for a variance or waiver as presented at that the last meeting. Motion carried 5-0.

Operations Report from Fire Department for February 2015

No discussion, report placed on file.

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Hardel presented the Tavern Report for February 6, 2015 through March 06, 2015. (*See attached.*)

Hardel noted restaurant compliance checks were done and are in the report; in the past they were not done as much due to short staffing levels.

Communications

Neal requested an update on the recent stabbing death on the east side in relation to gang activity for a future meeting. Hardel noted they reached out to Wausau School District to see if they would want to partner with us and we have set a Community Forum for this Thursday at 6:30 p.m., at Wausau East High School.

Rasmussen noted there will be a presentation by the Trap, Neuter, Return volunteer group at the meeting in April. Groat requested they add a \$15,000 budget for educational outreach regarding the garbage/recycling contract to the original motion voted earlier; committee agreed.

Adjournment

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 5:55 p.m.

Reduction of Feral Cat Population in Wausau Metro Area

A Proposal by Community Cat Action Team

Vision Statement

Community Cat Action Team (CCAT), in a working relationship with the City of Wausau and surrounding municipalities, the Humane Society of Marathon County (HSMC), The Fix Is In, and community members will substantially and humanely reduce the number of community cats, sometimes called feral cats, and their associated costs. Community Cat Action Team's goals are to identify and address existing colonies, trap and sterilize community cat populations, and provide community education.

The Issue

Community cat overpopulation in Wausau is an ongoing problem. The current practice of trapping and housing community cats is costly and has not reduced overpopulation. In 2014, the City of Wausau contracted with HSMC to receive community cats from Wausau, Schofield, and Weston at a cost of \$200 per cat. The contract provided for 150 cats during a nine-month period. The number of community cats brought in from those areas during that contract period was 232. These numbers are consistent with data from previous years.

The Proposed Model

The Trap/Neuter/Return (TNR) model is a standard protocol endorsed by the ASPCA and numerous other animal care organizations and is used in communities across the country to reduce free-roaming cat population.

How it works

- Trained volunteers and caregivers humanely trap feral cats.
- The cats are provided with a basic health exam, rabies vaccination, spay or neuter surgery, and post-surgical care. The tip of the left ear is clipped for future visual identification.
- The cats are returned to their home territory and allowed to live out their lives, often assisted by volunteer caregivers who feed, shelter, and facilitate any additional needs including neighborhood concerns.
- The breeding cycle is interrupted, resulting in a decrease in feline population over time through natural attrition.

Advantages

- Euthanasia and disposal rates are reduced, resulting in cost savings.
- TNR activities are coordinated and carried out by volunteers, reducing the cost to taxpayers of caring for these animals.
- Fixed cats who are returned to their location prevent other cats from moving in.
- Neutering cats significantly reduces their fighting, territory marking, and other mating-related behaviors, resulting in decreased nuisance calls to law enforcement and city officials.
- TNR is a way of managing community cat populations without the public relations difficulties related to a trap/kill program.
- Free-roaming community cats who are part of the TNR program would receive at least one rabies vaccination (rather than none, as they currently do) and TNR cats in organized colonies would be fed and cared for, reducing incidence of disease.
- A fully operational TNR program in the Wausau Metro Area would include kittens and socializable adult cats trapped through the TNR program being put up for adoption through HSMC, and feral cats brought in to HSMC entering the TNR program without the need for them to be held for a full week by HSMC at a current cost of \$185/cat.

Community Cats Action Team's Proposed Plan

Key Aspects of Long-Range Plan

- Monthly high-volume "spay day" open to the public with services donated by area vets/vet techs, with supplemental funding via CCAT and at-will donations for service
- Volunteer support for caregivers who need assistance with trapping
- Partnership with HSMC: adoptable cats and kittens entering the TNR program would be transferred to HSMC for adoption, and feral cats brought to HSMC would be transferred into the TNR program
- Partnerships with local veterinarians to provide low-cost, as-needed spay/neuter and vaccination for cats transferred into the TNR program on an ongoing basis
- Widespread acceptance of the need for responsible pet ownership, including pet cats being kept indoors unless altered and leashed
- Return to allowing public drop-off of strays/unwanted pets at HSMC to reduce dumping of unaltered cats in the community
- Dissemination of literature on TNR and community cats to area residents, including information for community members who wish to discourage community cats from entering their yards

Funding

Short-Term

- There are two separate private donations (\$1,000 and \$5,000) designated for this program.
- CCAT has access to 25 humane live traps.

Long-Term

- CCAT will apply for grant funds from the Community Foundation of North Central Wisconsin to purchase TNR equipment and services.
- CCAT will seek funds through local fundraising, from local business and private donations, and from national organizations such as the ASPCA grant program.
- CCAT will apply for 501(c)3 status at such time that it is required to access additional grant funds.
- As numbers of cats brought into HSMC go down, CCAT would ask that the county and/or municipalities consider funding a portion of the spay/neuter costs. Currently, The Fix Is In charges \$40/cat for basic spay/neuter and rabies vaccination. This is significantly lower than the current contract cost of \$185/cat for 7-day stay and euthanasia at HSMC.

Requested Cooperation From the City of Wausau

- CCAT asks that people working with the TNR program be exempted from Wausau City Ordinance 8.08.001, which defines pet ownership.
- With that exemption in place, the following ordinances, which apply to owned cats, would not hinder the activities of TNR caregivers, volunteers, and service providers:
 - 8.08.170 Licenses
 - 8.08.120 Number of Dogs and Cats Limited
 - 8.08.030 Dog-napping and Cat-napping
 - 8.08.190 Animals Not To Run At Large
 - 8.08.150 Abandonment

Target Areas

- CCAT has met with the Wausau Police Department Humane Officer to identify areas of the metro area that generate high volumes of nuisance calls related to community cats, as well as high volumes of captured free-roaming cats. CCAT would initially target these areas and include other areas as resources are available.

COMMENTS REGARDING
AMENDMENTS TO VARIOUS WAUSAU MUNICIPAL CODE
PROVISIONS TO PERMIT FOSTERING OF
DOGS AND CATS UNDER THE PET FANCIER PERMIT

- The City of Wausau has been requested to consider amending the Wausau Municipal Code to facilitate the fostering of dogs and cats under the Pet Fancier Permit. While the Pet Fancier Permit provisions do not preclude an individual from applying for such a permit in order to foster dogs and cats, apparently the provision which requires a dog or cat license for such animals somewhat hampers the ability of citizens to do so.
- The proposed amendments do not change the current limitations on the number of dogs and cats which may be kept in a single or two family dwelling unit.
- The proposed amendments do exclude those individuals fostering dogs or cats placed in their care by a non-profit animal rescue, shelter, or welfare group qualifying as an exempt organization under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code from the requirement to obtain a dog or cat license under W.M.C. §8.08.170. Such individuals would, however, be required to provide proof of rabies vaccination for each animal in order to obtain the Pet Fancier Permit.
- The Animal Control Officer has expressed her agreement with these changes.

A person applying for a pet fancier permit to provide, in whole or in part, temporary foster care shall additionally provide in the application for the permit, the name and address of each animal rescue, shelter, or welfare organization placing animals in his or her temporary foster care.

Implementation of Rental Licensing and Inspection

The rental inspection program started on January 5th, 2015. Through the first quarter of 2015 we have completed 404 dwelling unit inspections (approximately 200 buildings). Most of the inspections have gone fairly well. The most common code issues are smoke detectors missing, carbon monoxide alarms missing, electrical outlets improperly wired, missing handrails or guardrails.

Staff from inspections, police, fire, and the attorney's office met with the Wausau Area Apartment Association to discuss the rental licensing and inspection program on Friday, March 27th.

Overall we are projected to fall short of the 1st year goal for total number of rental inspections. Some of the issues are out of staff's control with missed or cancelled inspections or tenant's refusing entry. We are also looking at ways to increase the number of inspections with reassigning some personnel to rental inspections.

Community Service Officer – Property Maintenance Program

The CSO's will continue to follow up on complaints that our office receives. We are working with the police department to recruit new CSO's and also exploring vehicle opportunities so they can cover more ground. We anticipate utilizing door hangers more often if we cannot make personal contact to address property maintenance issues.

We anticipate the CSO's having a heavy workload with no spring clean-up. They will also be investigating properties that did not respond to our rental license mailings.

Inspection Software

We have selected a top candidate and started contract negotiations. This product is powerful and will fully serve our office from plan review and permitting, to inspections and violation tracking. We anticipate go-live around October 2015.


