Minutes of previous meeting(s) (6/15/15)

Withdrawn

Consider various license applications.

Rasmussen indicated there were several Operator's License applications that were recommended for denial, including Susan Green, Jordan Nead, Kevin Rutkowski, Desmareigh Meyer, and Rebecca Weber.

Kevin Rutkowski addressed the committee stating he understood the severity of his crime and has done a lot since then to better his life. The accident happened 13 years ago and since then he has gone back to school and earned a couple of degrees and now has an opportunity for promotion to manager at his job which requires the Operator's License. He stated he has not had alcohol since the night of his accident in 2003. Chief Hardel noted the accident resulted in a 2005 felony conviction of Homicide by Intoxicated Use of a Motor Vehicle. He and Alfonso interpreted the statutes to provide that a felony conviction which substantially relates to the licensed activity (bartending) would preclude an individual from holding an Operator's License. Rutkowski commented he wouldn't actually be bartending, he just needed to have the license to be the manager.

Susan Green addressed the committee stating she has held a bartender license in the Town of Stettin for the last two years. She indicated she had a misdemeanor possession of THC in 2001 due to circumstances with her husband, but she has never smoked pot herself. The other charges were for worthless checks and welfare fraud which was back in the 1980's and she has had a clean record since. She stated she was a Criminal Justice student and worked for Human Services. Hardel stated Ms. Green has two felony convictions of public assistance fraud and worthless checks, as well as the possession conviction.

It was noted that Rebecca Weber, Desmareigh Meyer and Jordan Nead were not present.

Rasmussen reviewed the list of special event applications, noting many of the authorization forms had not yet come back at the time of the packet mailing. Goede indicated many are coming back in now and are approved.

Rasmussen suggested approval contingent upon the return of the authorization forms. Wagner requested a letter be sent to event organizers to ensure they apply in a timely manner and meet the deadlines.

Neal requested that Kevin Rutkowski and Susan Green be voted on separately from the license batch.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to approve or deny various license applications as recommended by staff and that special events be approved contingent upon departmental review. Motion carried 5-0

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to approve the Operator's License for Susan Green. Neal felt that Ms. Green has gone 20 years without any charges and therefore should be given consideration. Gisselman asked Alfonso for an opinion and she explained the statutes in terms of what may be considered substantially related. Motion failed 2-3.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to approve the Operator's License for Kevin Rutkowski. Neal wanted to give him an opportunity to move forward from this one incident. Motion failed 1-4.

Request for permission to hold outdoor party, July 25, 2015 (Bob & Randy's Bar)

Rasmussen noted the committee has approved this outdoor party the last couple years and the owners have been very good about notifying neighbors. Tana Scobel stated they are proposing to start about 2:00 pm and will have a polka band and food. They will wrist band for alcohol and she would personally be present. There were no problems with the previous events.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the outdoor party at Bob & Randy's Bar. Motion carried 5-0.

Request for Premise Amendment for Outdoor Beer Garden & possible occasional outdoor entertainment (M&R Station)

Richard Gordon, owner, provided pictures of the enclosed fenced beer garden and indicated there would be security out there. He indicated they would like to eventually have music out there once or twice a month which would be done by 8:00 or 9:00 in the evening. Kujawa questioned if the garden had appropriate exits and Gordon indicated there was a gate on the north side. Hardel suggested they meet with Lt. Matt Barnes to discuss how the Police Department handles noise complaints.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the premise amendment and outdoor entertainment for M&R Station. Motion carried 5-0.

Consideration and possible action on complaint filed by Patricia Alalawneh under W.M.C. ch. 9.32, Discrimination in Housing Accommodations, Re: 1320 N 3rd Street, respondent Anna Mae Buttke.

Rasmussen stated the respondent landlord, Anna Mae Butke, was out of town and unable to attend the meeting. She noted this item does not include sworn testimony or witnesses. She invited the complainant, Patricia Alalawneh, to come forward to make remarks to the committee before they go into deliberation.

Patricia Alalawneh indicated she believed she was being discriminated by the landlord because she is black and told her side of the issue.

The Committee may convene into CLOSED SESSION pursuant to Section 19.85(1)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes for the purpose of considering the following: Deliberating concerning a case which was subject of any judicial or quasi-judicial trial or hearing before the governmental body to determine whether there is probable cause exists that there has been a violation of W.M.C. ch. 9.32, Discrimination in Housing Accommodations.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to move into closed session. Roll Call Vote. Motion carried unanimously.

Reconvened back into Open Session

Rasmussen stated after deliberation the majority of the committee agrees that it finds none of the information presented provides proof or probable cause that discrimination occurred or that the dispute between the parties is any different than what would occur between landlords and tenants of any race.

Motion by Neal, second by Gisselman to defer a decision to the next meeting in order to hear from both parties. Motion failed 2-3.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach for a finding of no probable cause. Motion carried 3-2.

Property Maintenance and Rental Inspection Report

Rasmussen stated Bill Hebert was called away unexpectedly and was unable to attend to present the report. She stated in excusing him from the meeting, she indicated to him if anyone had questions regarding the report in the packet she would get those to him after the meeting and he would answer them directly. Rasmussen noted they have been inspecting rental units almost full-time all summer. They schedule the inspections three weeks in advance and have been having some issues with cancellations. Report was placed on file.

Alfonso stated the decision regarding rental inspections came out of the Appellate Court in the La Crosse area. She explained the landlords there never raised an argument that rental licensing is beyond the authority of the Council to pass. Their issue was that the city cannot make the landlord give notice to the tenants that an inspection of the property is going to occur. The Appellate Court found in favor of the landlords and overturned the Circuit Court's decision in that regard, so that provision must be taken out. She noted our decision is still pending and she indicated she disagreed with that opinion.

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Hardel presented the Tavern Report for May 11, 2015 through June 3, 2015 (*See attached*). Report placed on file.

Hardel stated they are continuing to investigate the shooting that took place at Its Our Clubhouse and sent out the video to all Council members. He commented it was very serious in nature and we are happy no one was injured. He indicated they are canvassing the neighborhood and will have a report for the committee soon.

Ann Applegate, 709 Werle Avenue, stated there are many people in the neighborhood who are very concerned about the activity at this bar and don't feel safe. She commented the street the gun fire took place on is the street she drives home on. She encouraged the committee to consider the neighborhood in their deliberations.

Operations Report from Fire Department for June 2015

Kujawa stated on July 6th they hired four new firefighter/medics that will do their three week academy and then go for one month as a third on the ambulance and then they are put on shift, so by August we should be on full staff. She reported they are partnering with the American Red Cross for a smoke alarm event. One of the Red Cross initiatives within the next five years is to decrease fire deaths and injuries by 25% and they are partnering with fire departments throughout the United States. She indicated we did our campaign on June 20, 2015 installing 105 smoke detectors. We are second in the state only to Milwaukee for smoke detector installations. Kujawa stated they partnered with EFI Global again this year as well for fire investigation. We received quite a few grants in the past month, including one for \$140,000. Lastly, she reported there were only 32 hours of sick leave used in the month of June for the department.

Discussion and Possible action on Ordinance Repealing Chapter 9.40 Smoking prohibited inside restaurants and related Ordinances Amending Section 1.01.025(c)(1)(B) Schedule of cash deposits to include prohibition against smoking and chronic nuisance (1st Offense only) and 9.04.010 State statutes adopted to include prohibition against smoking.

Alfonso explained the police went to the Cabaret bar where a patron was smoking and wanted to issue a citation for violating the indoor smoking ordinance, but upon closer look, found that the city ordinance only prohibits smoking in restaurants. The state has since passed indoor smoking prohibition which is more encompassing than ours. In order for us to give a municipal citation for indoor smoking we need an ordinance to cover all of these places. She spoke with Nate Pekarski and they decided the best thing to do was repeal our current ordinance and simply adopt the state law in its entirety and assign the fine. This would allow us to enforce it; otherwise currently we have to refer it to the District Attorney's Office.

Alfonso explained in regard to the chronic nuisance, our ordinance has a range of fines of \$1000-\$2500 but because there is no bond amount, it requires the person to show up for court. We are proposing to set a bond amount at \$1300 so if people are inclined to just pay a fine without going to court they could do so.

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the proposed repeal of and amendments to the ordinances. Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion and Possible action on Repealing and Recreating Section 6.44.010 Definitions, and Amending Sections 6.44.020 Collection, 6.44.030 Separation, 6.44.040 Solid waste containers, 6.44.050 Draining and wrapping solid waste, 6.44.060 Location of waste and recycling containers for collection, 6.44.070 Certain disposal and removal prohibited, 6.44.080 Noncollectible materials, 6.44.090 Storing of refuse, 6.44.100 Enforcement and penalties

Maryanne Groat explained the ordinances are basically to reflect what our RFP was for automated services. It would mandate the use of the contractor provided cart for refuse and recycling; restrict participation in the curbside pickup to single family duplexes, triplexes, fourplexes, mobile homes and residential condominium units located in a structure that contains no more than eight units; establishing single stream recycling; establishing that each residential unit will receive one 65 gallon refuse cart and one 95 gallon recycling cart (residents will be restricted from making a change to the cart size for the first 90 day implementation period); carts must be spaced four feet apart and away from obstructions; and prohibited from putting things outside the carts. Groat indicated the educational material was being created for the public.

Alfonso noted she just needs to add the words "solid waste" to the second line of Section 6.44.070(c).

Motion by Neal, second by Kellbach to approve the ordinance as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

Mr. Morel claimed no knowledge of the previous incident, and was working with Officers to provide video footage of the more recent incident. The suspect was later arrested at a residence in Rothschild, with assistance from the Marathon County SWAT team.

Minutes of previous meeting(s) (5/18/15 & 6/15/15)

Motion by Kellbach, second by Gisselman to approve the minutes of previous meetings (5/18/15 and 6/15/15).
Motion carried 5-0.

Consider request for waiver of 3.06.010(a) Payment of taxes, claims forfeitures, judgments prior to issuance of license or permit, due to extraordinary financial hardship. (Cassandra Scheffler)

Cassandra Scheffler, 783 Cherry Dr, Eland, addressed the committee stating she was approved for a license in Wausau; however, it was put on hold for approximately \$525-\$600 in fines. She is moving back to the Wausau area and has obtained a job at The Plaza and needs the Operator's License. She indicated she was willing to set up a payment plan to pay off her fines. Rasmussen questioned if she could get them paid off by renewal time prior to July 1, 2015 and she indicated that she could.

Motion by Gisselman, second by Kellbach to approve the financial hardship waiver to release her license with a payment plan in which the debt is satisfied by renewal time. Motion carried 4-0.

Consider various license applications.

Rasmussen stated there were two Operator's License applications recommended for denial by Chief Hardel for Jamie Duginski and Peter Rockman.

Jamie Duginski, 926 S 21st Ave, Wausau, addressed the committee asking for approval of his license to work at the Pine Ridge gas station. He noted everything on his record happened 12 years ago. He moved to Florida for four years and has moved back to Wisconsin, however, he has run into several instances since returning where his past has come back to haunt him.. He stated he helped raise a family for six and a half years and had a successful landscaping business in Florida for two years, through which he purchased all of his equipment and built a customer base of 86 good paying customers. He paid off all his equipment and sold his accounts to finance his move back home to Wisconsin. He wants to pursue and grow his landscaping business here during the day and has nine paying accounts currently, but needs the job at Pine Ridge to accomplish this.

Chief Hardel commended Duginski for making good decisions and changing his life around, however, he informed the committee the record includes a number of felony convictions. There were charges of 2nd Degree sexual assault of a child, which was dismissed but read in; possession of drug paraphernalia; possession of THC; and exposing genitals to a child. He noted some these charges did not show the disposition. Duginski explained the sexual assault charge had to do with a relationship with his girlfriend when they were underage that her mother did not want and the exposing genitals to a child was in reference to Playboy pictures on the wall where his underage girlfriend was present. Hardel stated there is also a felony charge of possession with intent to deliver THC; felony maintaining a drug trafficking place; felony arson; and habitual criminality. Duginski acknowledged he made a lot of bad choices back then and took responsibility for them and was not hiding anything. He indicated he completed a prison sentence, educated himself and put himself through college after he got out and has taken his life in a different direction from the past. Rasmussen stated she was concerned with the totality of the record and the portability of the license.

Gary Schwartz, N2751 Thiel Dr, Merrill, owner of Pine Ridge Wausau, LLC, spoke on Jamie Duginski's behalf. He knew of his background, was willing to stand behind him and asked the committee to give him a chance.

Wagner understood sometimes when people are young they make foolish mistakes and it takes something dramatic to turn around. He noted Duginski had a lot of felonies, which concerned him, but suggested a one year license.

Motion by Wagner, second by Gisselman to approve a One Year Restricted Operator's License for Jamie Duginski.
Motion carried 3-1. (*Rasmussen was the dissenting vote.*)

Rasmussen noted Peter Rockman was not present to address the committee. She reviewed the special event applications on the list.

Motion by Kellbach, second by Gisselman to approve or deny the rest of the licenses as recommended by staff. Motion carried 4-0.

Discussion and expression of concern for compliance issues at the VFW beer garden during the WI Valley Fair.

Chief Hardel stated we had some concerns last year during the fair because the VFW allowed individuals to leave their stand with beer. He felt they did not take that responsibility serious and when confronted denied that it was from their tent even though it was witnessed by an officer. Hardel stated he had requested they obtain independent security for this year's fair, but it was not supported by the committee. There were meetings with the VFW and officers for this year, who came away with the impression that the VFW would hire security and the Fair Board also thought they would hire security; however, they did not.

Hardel stated the Police Department conducted a compliance check sending in underage individuals to the VFW tent as well as all of the other beer tents at the fair. He noted they were informed in advance there was to be a compliance check and explained they had to check IDs. The VFW sold to the underage person upon the first compliance check and officers met with them the next day to advise them they failed and that we would be checking again. The next night the second check was done and they failed again. He had the same concerns as last year that they do not take the responsibility serious and recommended the committee not allow them to have a picnic license for next year. If the committee chooses to grant them one he requested they mandate that they hire security.

Jack Pettit, VFW Post Commander, and Roger Sydow, Chairman for the VFW for the fair were present. Sydow commented on last year stating he did not deny the incident and the person at the gate was removed at that time. Hiring guards was discussed with the committee last year, but his understanding of the requirements was to meet with police in the spring of the year, which was done with Cpt Barnes. He stated we were to provide our security plan and at that time we had contacted a security company as backup in the event our plan was not approved. He changed the guards for this year and attempted to schedule them appropriately and he thought this was acceptable. He acknowledged they were informed that the compliance checks were going to be done and the entire process was explained to them. Signs were also placed as requested and he thought they had complied with the committees requests for this year. He commented he had no explanation for the compliance failures under the circumstances, but it was one individual both times, which wasn't even one of our members. He indicated the individual was removed and there were no further incidents. He commented they do take this very seriously.

Rasmussen stated the issue is that it keeps happening at the fair as well as at the VFW Lounge, showing a pattern of behavior. She noted the other two organizations at the fair use private security and wristbands and they pass these compliance checks. She questioned why there was an issue with hiring private security. Sydow indicated the main issue was the cost of approximately \$20 per hour.

Rasmussen stated it was not necessary to take action for the 2016 fair tonight; we had it on the agenda for discussion and to express our concerns. The committee will consider requiring private security for next year and they could impose that contingency in the spring when the picnic license comes before us for approval. Wagner suggested they bring their plan in writing to the meeting in the spring along with their picnic license application. Rasmussen recommended he meet with the police department on this plan before it comes to committee. Pettit ensured the committee there will be some changes.

Consider the Complaint filed regarding Its Our Clubhouse LLC (d/b/a Its Our Clubhouse) and take possible action on issuance of a summons commanding it to appear before the Committee for a hearing to show cause why the Class "B" Beer & Liquor License issued should not be revoked.

Chief Hardel described the "shoot out" incident that occurred which was the impetus to this revocation request on the Police Department's behalf. He indicated they conducted a neighborhood survey and 80-90% of the people in that area stated the decline of the neighborhood and the loss of safety is a result of the activity at this bar. He stated it is the department's opinion that the owner, Mr. Morel, has provided an environment at his bar where people feel comfortable and are not being held accountable for their behavior in the bar and therefore, he should not be holding a liquor license.

Bryan Morel addressed the committee stating he felt things had improved since the suspension ended and debated some of the police service calls as incidental or made by bar staff. He stated neither he nor his employees had anything to do with the shooting. He requested the address of the complainant that was filed because he wanted proof that he was a resident.

Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to move forward with a formal revocation hearing. Motion carried 4-0. Rasmussen stated he would be notified within 10 days of the hearing date.

Operations Report from Fire Department for July 2015

Chief Kujawa reported there was a fire today at the Ponderosa Motel and quick response contained it to one room. She reiterated her need for support from this committee and the Common Council moving forward on accreditation. It will require a lot of work from the department and there is some cost associated with it. The registration fee is \$500 and they were planning on registering in September. The applicant status will happen in 2016 at a cost of approximately \$6,500 and then the candidate agency status, which means a peer group, comes in for an onsite assessment in 2018 is about \$7,500. There will be additional cost to send our people to present to the accreditation agency at the conference in 2018. It is a long process with a total cost of \$16,000 - \$18,000. She noted there has been some suggestion that in future years Medicare and Medicaid are looking at not paying agencies that are not accredited. They are looking at an accreditation standard so that they know you are performing at a very high level. Motion by Gisselman, second by Kellbach to place this item on the agenda for next month so that we can take official action in promoting this both for Finance Committee and to the City Council. Motion carried unanimously.

HEARING: Gayle Pankow, owner, appeal of dangerous animal designation declaration - Rascal

Rasmussen opened the hearing and the clerk swore in the witnesses to give testimony. Rasmussen explained the process of the hearing and opened the floor for testimony.

Gayle Pankow, owner of Rascal, relayed the dog bite incidents from her perspective. She indicated a veterinarian suggested anxiety medication may help Rascal. She requested they repeal the dangerous animal designation and she will keep him on a leash. Rasmussen questioned where she was with complying with the restrictions of the dangerous animal designation to date. She stated she is on disability with a fixed income and is going to save money to have him neutered and was willing to microchip him.

Testimony was taken from Humane Officer Ashlee Bishop and Officer Peterson.

Closed Session pursuant to Section 19.85(1)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes for the purpose of considering the following: Deliberating concerning a case which was the subject of any judicial or quasi-judicial trial or hearing before the governmental body

Motion by Wagner, second by Gisselman to move into closed session. Roll Vote was taken; motion carried unanimously.

Reconvened back into Open Session

Rasmussen read the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law upholding the dangerous animal declaration of the Chief of Police and that the owner must comply with the requirements set forth in the ordinance. Hardel noted the dog is currently being held at the Humane Society because the owner is not in compliance and he will be kept there until she comes into compliance with at least most of those requirements.

Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities

Hardel presented the Tavern Report for July 3, 2015 through August 3, 2015. (*See attached.*)

Hardel reported the last few compliance checks that were conducted received very poor compliance of 40-50%. He indicated the department has a plan and we are discussing internally as to what we can do to help educate and we also plan to set up a meeting with Tavern League President, Tim Thomas.

Communications

The committee scheduled the revocation hearing for Its Our Clubhouse for Monday, August 31, 2015 at 5:15 pm.

Adjournment Motion by Wagner, second by Kellbach to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 7:30 pm.



Cop Shoppe Pub, 701 Washington St.

ALCOHOL BEVERAGE DEMERIT POINTS ASSESSED

- **Loppnow's, Malarky's, Campus Pub, VFW Beer Tent and Eagle's Club** all sold to underage volunteers during August Alcohol Compliance checks (August 5, 2015). 25 Demerit Points each. **Quality Foods IGA** (E. Wausau Ave.), **CVS Pharmacy, Walgreen's** (S. 17th Ave.), **Roc's Place, Wausau Noon Optimists Beer Tent and Lion's Club Beer Tent** all successfully denied sales to the underage volunteers.
- **It's Our Clubhouse and Yours** was assessed 100 points for Failure to Maintain an Orderly Premises (50) with the enhancer that it was a severe offense (50, substantial risk of death or bodily harm and involved the use of a firearm). They currently have 175 Demerit Points.
