
Memorial Day Parade - Participants Wanted!



Bartram's Boxes Remix

A collaboration between Philadelphia's Center for Art in Wood and Bartram's Garden resulted in unusual and inspired artworks. John Bartram, America's first botanist, shipped to British clients wooden boxes he filled with seeds, dried plants, and natural history curiosities that transformed the European landscape with colorful specimens from New World gardens. These eighteenth-century seed sales supported his Philadelphia botanic garden and three generations of research.



Sharrows

Throughout the summer and fall of 2014, city crews began updating the roadway markings on various streets throughout the city with "Sharrows". You will see the new bike markings on Grand Avenue, Third Avenue, and other main roadways throughout the city. Sharrows are pavement markings designating a shared bicycle and motor vehicle travel lane, the shared lane is not a specifically designated bicycle lane. The markings are designed to indicate where the bicyclists should be anticipated to operate. They are meant to increase awareness to the possible presence of bicycle traffic in these areas and are often used when roadway conditions or width may not permit a dedicated bicycle lane.

A bicycle is considered a vehicle and bicyclists are granted the same rights and duties of the driver of any other vehicle. The motoring public should expect bicyclists to be using a lane of traffic much like a vehicle and should remember to give bicyclists 3 feet of clearance when passing. Also, bicyclists are required to ride in the same direction as other traffic and should obey all traffic laws, signs, and signals.



Construction/ Remodeling Projects

If you are planning any construction or remodeling projects, we would like to remind you that building permits are required for most projects within the City of Wausau, including installation/replacement of siding and roofing, construction of decks, stoops, ramps, and sheds, and for alterations/remodeling (kitchen cabinets, drywalling, etc.). Separate permits are required for any electrical or plumbing work.

Permits are required not only to ensure your project meets City zoning regulations and complies with City and State building codes, but also lets us assist you in achieving a project that is safe and structurally sound.

The inspectors are typically in the office between 8:00-9:00 AM and 12:30-1:30 PM, Monday through Friday, to review plans, issue permits and answer questions. The remainder of the work day, they conduct on-site inspections. If these times are not convenient for you, contact the Division of Inspection and Zoning at 715.261.6780, and they are generally able to make other arrangements for you to meet with their staff.

Fences: Permits are also required for the construction, erection and placement of fences on properties in the City, and for the replacement or expansion of existing fences. The purpose for requiring permits for fences is to ensure the location, height, materials and maintenance of them, so they properly comply with City regulations and in order to prevent the creation of nuisances.

Property Maintenance Reminders



The City of Wausau has ordinances that are designed to protect the public's health and safety, and to preserve the appearance of neighborhoods. For the most part, City residents take great pride in maintaining their property in an aesthetically-pleasing condition, and comply with City ordinances. Following are the most common violations observed by City Inspectors, and most are subject to immediate tickets:

Exterior Property Areas:

- Shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition, free from any accumulation of items, garbage, debris, yard waste.
- Dog/animal excreta must be picked up on a daily basis, so as to minimize health hazards.
- Furniture, not intended for outdoor use, is not allowed on yards or open porches.

Vehicles:

- Must be parked on established driveway/parking areas that are hard-surfaced.
- Parking on the grass is not allowed.
- Vehicles that are unregistered/unlicensed, inoperable, abandoned, or in any state of major disassembly, disrepair, or undergoing overhaul are not allowed to be parked on residential properties.
- Motor vehicle repair is not allowed on residential properties.

Trash Containers, Recyclable Containers and Trash:

- Can be set out for collection after 3:00 PM on the day before pickup.
- All containers must be removed from the curb-side/boulevard area by 11:00 AM the day after pickup.
- Between pickups, trash and recyclable containers must be stored inside a garage or behind the front of the house.
- During winter months, trash containers must not be placed on snow banks.
- Trash containers must be:
 - Of substantial construction with tight-fitting covers and strong handles on the outside;
 - Watertight and flyproof, and shall not exceed a capacity of 35 gallons; and
 - Any container when filled shall not weigh more than 50 pounds.
- Landlords must provide a sufficient number of containers to hold the recyclable and nonrecyclable solid waste for their properties.

Recreational Equipment:

- Motor homes, camping and travel trailers, boats, boat trailers, snowmobiles, ATV's, utility trailers, etc. cannot be parked or stored in any required front yard or corner side yard, except for on a designated driveway which meets the City's hard-surfacing requirements.
- Equipment or trailers that are longer than 30' (measured from back bumper to tongue) must be parked within enclosed structures.

Signs: Rummage sale, garage sale, real estate, advertising or other such signs cannot be placed on boulevards, other public right-of-ways or attached to public utility poles.

Wausau Emergency Police Unit Wausau, Wisconsin

The Wausau Emergency Police Unit is seeking volunteers to give of their time to protect the community. This unit assists the Wausau Police Department during major functions where traffic control and extra security is needed and is on call to assist as needed during an emergency.

The Unit is comprised of volunteers from various communities, who are willing to give of their time in such an effort. All of the parades, some 5k & 10k races, the Balloon Rally & Glow, the Wisconsin Valley Fair, The Festival of the Arts, Art in the Park, and other events are worked as needed. The Unit is also ready for any Emergency; such as: storms, floods, or any other happenings where the police may need additional staffing for scene security and crowd control. Wausau Emergency Police have training at various times during the year and work hard to be ready. The present director is Larry W. Jaeger and his executive officer is Major Frank Schuelke. The police liaison is Patrol Lieutenant Dwayne J. Dachel. There are three Squads and at present 35 Officers. As in any volunteer organization, we are always looking for new recruits. A candidate must be at least 18 years of age, pass a background check and an interview to become a member. Our members range in age from 18 to 70 plus, both male and female. The unit provides the uniform, except pants and shoes. Meetings are generally held on a monthly basis.

Snow Fighting Fleet

When emergencies happen in the Wausau area, the City of Wausau public works employees respond 24/7, 365 days a year. It does not matter if it is a weekend, night or holiday - these dedicated professionals respond to the public needs. For instance, when it snows 30 personnel from the Department of Public Works mobilize the snow fighting fleet to make the streets, sidewalks and City-owned parking lots safe for the public.

The City is divided into 27 routes which is covered by a fleet consisting of five tri-axle salt trucks; two tri-axle plow trucks equipped with plows, wings and spreaders; nine single-axle plow trucks with plow, wings, and spreaders; four front end loaders with plows and wings; one front end loader with a large plow for City parking lots and the Wausau Downtown Airport; and two motor graders equipped with wings. In addition, our fleet includes one front end loader in the stockpile areas to load material as needed. To maintain the sidewalks, parking structures and some surface lots we have three sidewalk plows, one small track loader and one super duty truck equipped with a plow and spreader. Additionally, one Supervisory staff and two Fleet Maintenance personnel are included to support the operation.

Public Works touches all of our lives every day. In accordance with the tradition of the American Public Works Association we would like to thank those who work in professions that provide and maintain public facilities and services. Public Works professionals include those who manage water, sewer, public transportation, are responsible for maintaining public buildings and grounds, and improve the systems and services vital to a community's health, safety and comfort.

We value our community and the role Public Works professionals play in keeping them safe and functioning smoothly. Please join in showing our appreciation to these dedicated employees during National Public Works Week, May 17-23, 2015.



2015 Recycling Collection Calendar

Refer to the table and the calendar to determine your recycling and garbage pick-up day. If you have any questions as to whether you live in a blue or yellow collection area, call City Hall at 261-6500. Residents are recommended to use a City authorized green recycling bin for recycling to be identified by the drivers. Recycling bins should be set out with garbage containers between the hours of 3:00 pm the day before pick-up and 5:45 a.m. the day of collection, and containers should be removed from the curbside area by 11:00 a.m. the day after pick-up. Between pick-ups, bins and containers should be kept where they are not visible from the front of your property. **Keep this schedule for future reference and remember the holiday schedule of a "day delay" pick-up.**

2015 Major Road Construction Projects

The following city streets are anticipated to be reconstructed in the Summer of 2015:

S. 22nd Avenue: Nehring Street to N. of Wegner Street
 Flieth Street: Park Boulevard to 11th Avenue
 Grant Street: Bellis Street to 10th Street
 11th Street: McClellan Street to Franklin Street
 7th Street: Spring Street to Crocker Street
 Crocker Street: 7th Street to 13th Street
 2nd Avenue: Stewart Avenue to Elm Street
 Clark Street: 2nd Avenue to cul de sac

Description: The street reconstructions will include removing the existing street surface, installing new sanitary sewer, water main, storm sewer, curb and gutter and pavement. Sanitary sewer and water laterals will also be replaced where required.

Traffic Impacts: The streets will be closed to thru traffic during construction. Residents should have access to their driveways for a majority of the project.

Parking

Just a reminder, the even/odd overnight parking rules began on April 1st. On odd calendar days, overnight parking is permitted on the side of the street with odd house numbers. On even calendar days, overnight parking is permitted on the even side of the street.

If you intend on parking overnight on a city street, please remember that the calendar day changes at midnight. For example, if you park your car on the street on May 1st at 9PM and intend to leave it overnight, you must park on the even side of the road. At 2:30AM, the date is actually May 2nd and the overnight parking ordinance is in effect between the hours of 2:30AM and 6AM.

Also, please be courteous when parking in your own driveway by NOT parking over/on the sidewalk.

The City of Wausau is having a city-wide revaluation for 2015.

First, the Change of Assessment Notices will be mailed. These notices are targeted to go out towards the end of summer. The exact date is not known at this time, but as we get further along in the revaluation process we will update information for our taxpayers. These notices will show your 2015 assessment (value).

Second, after the notices are mailed we will have an Open Book period. Open Book is when the Assessment Roll is first available for public review. It is also a period when you can make appointments to come in, review your property record card and discuss any valuation concerns you may have with a property appraiser. Most assessment questions can be answered during the informal "Open Book" process. If your opinion of value for your property differs from the value on your notice, come in and discuss the matter with us.

Third, after talking with us, if you still find a significant difference between your assessment and what you feel is your property's market value, you

may file a formal objection with the Board of Review. This objection for the Board of Review must be filed in writing with the City Clerk. For complete details on the appeal process visit: www.revenue.wi.gov/pubs/slf/pb060.pdf to view "The Guide for Property Owners" published by the Wisconsin Department of Revenue, Division of State & Local Finance, Bureau of Assessment Practices.

At the Board of Review the best evidence of value would be a recent arms-length sale price of your property. The next best evidence of value is sales prices of other properties comparable to your property. Lacking either of the above, oral testimony by a qualified witness who has made a market value appraisal of the property is also good evidence. The board will determine the market value of your property as indicated by the evidence submitted by you and by the Assessor. After your hearing, the Board of Review will go into deliberations to make a determination of value. You will receive a written notice of the Board's determination after the hearing.

Lastly, you have the further right to appeal the Board of Review decision.

Manufacturing property is not assessed at the local level. The Wisconsin Department of Revenue assesses all manufacturing property in the State of Wisconsin.





Be Aware Near Dams!

Wisconsin Public Service reminds everyone to use caution when recreating near hydroelectric dams this spring. Thin ice, high water flow, cold water temperatures, debris in the water and unpredictable weather can make activities on the flowages and rivers hazardous. While dams are vital to our electric supply, these facilities can be dangerous to unwary visitors. Please treat dams and surrounding areas with respect and always exercise caution.

Don't go in or near the waters immediately above or below the dams. Strong, unpredictable currents may not be visible on the water's surface.

Pay attention to the warning signs, buoys and barriers WPS has installed, and stay a safe distance away.


Avoid spillways that can suddenly and unexpectedly discharge large amounts of water.

Residential Rental Licensing

The City of Wausau's residential rental licensing ordinance is in force. This ordinance was enacted to encourage property owners who rent residential dwelling units to exercise their responsibility to ensure that they maintain safe, decent and sanitary living conditions for residents living in the units and to prevent blighted conditions. All rental dwelling units within the City are required to be licensed, including single-family homes that are rented out. Rental licenses are not transferable—owners, upon purchasing any rental property, must apply for a rental license within thirty (30) days.

As part of the rental licensing program, an inspection is required every three (3) years. Through March, approximately 200 properties (400 dwelling units) have been inspected under the program.

In 1954, Leigh Yawkey Woodson and her daughters donated the home of her late parents, lumberman Cyrus C. Yawkey and Alice Richardson Yawkey, to the Historical Society. The house was built in 1900 in the Classical Revival style and later remodeled in the Prairie School style. In 1974, the house was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Yawkey estate, now known as the Yawkey House Museum, has been fully restored and is open for tours. Guided tours of the Yawkey House Museum begin on the hour.

In 1995, the Society purchased the home of A.P. Woodson and Leigh Yawkey Woodson, located at 410 McIndoe Street which is across the street from the Yawkey House Museum. The house was built in 1914 and designed by Prairie School architect, George W. Maher. Now known as the Woodson History Center, the Woodson house contains three exhibit halls, a research library and administrative offices. The Woodson History Center is free and open to the public.

Spring Watermain Flushing Schedule

2015 Schedule of Rates

Annual Hydrant Flushing to Begin at 7:30 a.m. on Monday, May 4

Water utility employees will begin flushing fire hydrants at 7:30 a.m. on Monday morning, May 4, 2015, as part of our annual maintenance program. Flushing accomplishes two tasks; first, it cleans the mains of mineral buildup, and secondly, it ensures that all hydrants are in good operating order.

Unlike previous years, the flushing will be performed during the daytime hours from 7:30 a.m. until about 3:00 p.m. during which time over 1600 hydrants will be flushed. This process takes three weeks to complete. The change to the schedule this year to do all the flushing during daylight hours is to improve safety for our employees as well as being able to ensure that hydrants are being adequately flushed. **A complete schedule of the hydrant flushing is printed on page 3 of this newsletter.**

Residents are urged to avoid water use when the flushing occurs near their neighborhood, **especially for laundry purposes**, as it may stain clothing. Water softeners should also be bypassed during this time. Some homeowners may experience very low pressure during the flushing process. As flushing occurs in your neighborhood, businesses and homes may experience dirty water for a short period of time.

Residents are also cautioned about driving in the area where the flushing is occurring. Water from hydrants is under extreme pressure, with approximately 1,000 gallons per minute being discharged. Although our employees use caution, damage to your vehicle can result if you drive through an area where hydrants are being flushed.



Water Rates Increase April 1, 2015

Water rates for City of Wausau residents increased as of April 1, 2015. For the average family of four, based on 2400 cu. ft., water rates will increase from \$56.01 to \$66.00 per quarter, or \$3.33 per month. A family of two that uses 1200 cu. ft. will likely see about a \$1.69 per month increase. Public Fire Protection fees will also increase from \$8.96 to \$9.57 per quarter (based on the smallest residential meter size).

In July, 2014, Wausau Water Works submitted a request to the Public Service Commission (PSC) to review our rates to ensure adequate funds for operations, infrastructure replacements and debt service. The PSC performed a cost of study analysis and determined the rates to be charged each of the customer classes. A full schedule of rates is shown on page 4 of this newsletter.

Although we understand that no one likes to see their water bills increase, we remind customers that the utility does not get any financing through the city tax rolls. Our operating revenues are solely obtained through our rates. Our last full rate increase was put into place in 2006. Water, which is needed to sustain life, continues to be one of the lowest priced commodities available.

Private Well Permits

With the days getting warmer and longer, it urges us to get out and work on our lawns and gardens. With that in mind, Wausau Water Works reminds property owners that the WDNR requires permits for any property in the City of Wausau that has a private well. The cost of the permit is \$15.00 for five years. In order to obtain a permit, the well must be inspected and pass a bacteriological test. Owners of any property with a well that does not have a current permit should make arrangements to have the well inspected and permitted as soon as possible by a licensed well driller or pump installer. Any well that fails the bacteriological test twice must be abandoned by a licensed well driller or pump installer.

Deferred Payment Agreements

Residents with past due or large water and sewer bills may request deferred payment agreements to help them pay off balances prior to bills being transferred to the property taxes. Inquiries regarding deferred payment agreements may be made by calling Wausau Water Works at 715-261-6530. Please ask for Terry.

Please note that proof of income and monthly expenses may be required to help set up an equitable payment agreement.

Testing of Lead Service Lines Still Available

Wausau Water Works is still looking to test properties with lead water service laterals. After the 2014 lead exceedance, staff met with the WDNR who advised that they would allow the utility to test lead water service laterals instead of replacing them. The cost savings is quite significant, with testing costs at approximately \$75.00-\$100.00 each versus approximately \$5,000.00-\$6,000.00 each to replace the City's portion of the lead lateral. While replacements will still be done in areas where there will be road reconstruction projects, we will still need to test approximately 325 homes to meet the requirements of the WDNR/EPA for this year. If you would like to see if your home qualifies to be tested, please contact Wausau Water Works at 715-261-7262.

Properties that should by chance test high will not be required to replace their service laterals at this time. However, it would be encouraged down the road if a road reconstruction project were to be done in your area. What is recommended is that you adequately flush the water line by running 1 to 2 gallons of water to draw fresh water in from the water main, anytime the water has sat unused for 6 hours or longer. This should be done from faucets from which you would normally drink, such as the kitchen or bathroom faucets. Wausau Water Works is working with Clark Dietz to monitor the corrosion potential of our drinking water to minimize the amount of lead absorbed from household plumbing.

Call Diggers Hotline Before You Dig

Construction projects such as installing decks, fences and tree planting are another sign of spring. Homeowners are reminded to contact Diggers Hotline before you dig by simply dialing 811 from any land line or cell phone. Or, you can place an online request at www.diggershotline.com

Homeowners are also reminded that they must allow 3 business days (not including the day the request is called in) for all their utilities to be located before they dig, and should plan their projects accordingly. There is no cost to the homeowner to contact Diggers Hotline, who will then inform all utilities with buried facilities, such as water, sewer, gas and electric utilities, telephone and cable companies of your intentions to dig in a specific area.

Spring Watermain Flushing Schedule

Utility crews will flush watermains through the operation of hydrants during **daytime hours from 7:30 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.** Please note that this is a change from prior years when the hydrant flushing was performed overnight. You may want to draw a supply of water prior to your area being flushed. Please be aware that adjacent neighborhoods to the area being flushed may experience dirty water for short periods of time.

Avoid water use during the scheduled flush, especially for laundry purposes. It is particularly important not to use bleach in your laundry as it may stain your clothing. It is also suggested that you bypass water softeners during this time. Please also be aware that some homeowners may experience very low pressure during the flushing process.


