## **PUBLIC HEALTH & SAFETY COMMITTEE**

### **Minutes of the previous meeting(s) (9/17/18, & 9/25/18)**

Motion by Kellbach, second by Peckham to approve the minutes of previous meeting (9/17/18 & 9/25/18). Motion carried 4-0.

### **Consider approval or denial of various license applications**

Rasmussen stated there were two denial recommendations for Operator's Licenses: Jameson Diedrich and Eboni Smith; and three denials for Public Transport Licenses: Daniel Bacholl, Dwaine C. Hammons II, and Samantha Williams.

1. Jameson Diedrich addressed the committee asking them to consider the fact that for the past three years he has re-applied once a year for his license. He stated he has not had any new charges for the past year and a half and obtained a bartender's license in Rib Mountain. He indicated he had a new position at Timekeeper Distillery and the owners were present with him in support of approval of a license. They would like him to be a key holder of the premises. He pointed out the OWI charge that was pending has been expunged and the two THC possession charges were for very small amounts and were more than three and four years old respectively.

Chief Bliven indicated he had a conversation with Mr. Diedrich about this application and explained our policy and although his record met the criteria for a denial recommendation, one of the charges is almost outside of the five year window. He noted he hasn't had a violation for two and half to three years, so the committee could take all of this into consideration in regard to his appeal.

Motion by McElhaney, second by Peckham to consider Jameson Diedrich separately from the batch and to grant the Operator's License. Motion carried 4-0.

2. Eboni Smith stated she recently had disorderly conducts and domestic related charges with her ex-boyfriend which happened at home. She indicated she also received a possession charge, but was trying to take responsibility for all of her actions to correct them to become a better person. She was trying make sure she has a job so as to keep busy and not to find herself in all this trouble. An Operator's License would give her opportunities for more jobs and responsibility.

Rasmussen was concerned because these violations were very recent and one was a 2018 felony charge for criminal damage to property. Chief Bliven clarified the felony was dismissed but read in. Rasmussen pointed out that one of the domestic charges had a notation for use of a weapon. She felt Ms. Smith needed some time to pass without any more charges before they could consider granting the license.

3. Daniel Bacholl appealed the denial of his Public Transport Driver License and submitted some letters from Corrections and Northcentral Health Care in support. His employment specialist through NCHC was present on his behalf, noting the crime was approximately 15 years ago and that he was one of their model clients in the community treatment program. She stated he had a good support team.

Rasmussen stated she had serious concerns with the charge of First Degree Intentional Homicide Felony A. Chief Bliven stated Mr. Bacholl was found Guilty but Not Guilty Due to Mental Disease/Defect. He felt the community would be concerned with a driver with that record so he confirmed his recommendation of denial.

It was noted that Dwaine C. Hammons II and Samantha Williams were not present to appeal.

Motion by Peckham, second by McElhaney to approve or deny licenses as recommended by staff. Motion carried 4-0.

**Discussion and possible action regarding an ordinance creating Section 5.64.036 Drive-up Sales**

Rasmussen stated a couple months ago Applebee's was seeking a premise amendment to allow the delivery of alcoholic beverages in their "Carside to Go" pick up spot. These type of requests are being test marketed in Wisconsin to see which communities will allow it. She noted the City of Neenah has already passed an ordinance which places a restriction on Drive-up alcohol sales, also called Click & Collect. She commented a Class B license premise can sell closed containers for carryout at any time, but they conduct that transaction face to face by a licensed server so they can determine if the person is overserved or underage. This type of premise amendment would allow Applebee's to sell alcohol and pass it through a car window with the food. She indicated through previous committee discussion there was a consensus that alcohol transactions should take place inside the licensed establishment where the bartender can see the person making the purchase.

Rasmussen indicated the ordinance under consideration is the same as the one adopted in Neenah. It adds to our licensing chapter that drive-up alcohol sales are prohibited. She referred to a couple of articles in support of regulation of Click & Collect alcohol sales from Marathon County AOD Partnership Council and the League of Wisconsin Municipalities.

Peckham commented he did not feel our community needed any more opportunities to buy alcohol, as there are already plenty. He felt it could pose potential problems and we have experts advising us to stay away from it.

Motion by Peckham, second by Kellbach to approve the ordinance prohibiting Drive-up alcohol sales. Motion carried 4-0.

**HEARING: Appeal of Revocation of Recreational Fire Permit - Jesse and Nicole Schellinger, 1760 Cherry St.**

Rasmussen explained the procedure for the quasi-judicial hearing and the witnesses to give testimony were sworn in by the clerk: Police Chief Ben Bliven, Fire Marshall David DeSantis, Fire Battalion Chief Paul Czarapata, and property owners Nicole and Jesse Schellinger. (Full testimony can be accessed on the city's website by viewing the meeting.)

Testimony was given by Nicole and Jesse Schellinger explaining each incident reported at their property and indicated that they felt a neighbor was targeting them. Questions followed by the committee members and Attorney Alfonso.

Testimony by the Fire Department was given by Paul Czarapata and Dave DeSantis, as well as Police Chief Bliven. A body camera video was shown to the committee. Alfonso followed up with questions and showed a body-cam video of the September 2<sup>nd</sup> response to the property.

Motion by Peckham, second by Kellbach to convene in Closed Session. Roll Call Vote: Ayes: McElhaney, Kellbach, Peckham and Rasmussen. (Herbst not present). Noes: 0. Motion carried 4-0.

**RECONVENED into OPEN SESSION** and announce results of deliberations on appeal of revocation of Recreational Fire Permit.

Rasmussen read the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law upholding the revocation of the recreational fire permit held by Jesse & Nicole Schellinger, issued by Fire Chief Tracey Kujawa on September 7, 2018.

**HEARING: Cameron Mayotte, owner, appeal of dangerous animal declaration dated October 8, 2018 – Dog: Capone**

Rasmussen stated Cameron Mayotte was not present, therefore the decision dangerous animal declaration is upheld.

**Operations Report from Fire Department for September 2018**

Peckham questioned what a "good intent call" was noted in the report. Czarapata explained these were calls they receive from cell phones that are not fires or car accidents, but someone is calling with good intent that there may be an issue which they have observed. *Report placed on file.*

**Tavern Activities / Compliance Checks / Law Enforcement Activities**

Chief Bliven presented the Tavern Report for September 1, 2018 through September 30, 2018. *(See attached)*

McElhaney commented on the many incidents on the report of both Christine's and Roc's Place and asked the Chief to address it. Chief Bliven stated staff has a good rapport with the staff at Christine's. He indicated Roc's Place is heavily patrolled on a nightly basis and mitigating as much as we can. *Report placed on file*

### **Consider request of James W. Kruesel LLC, dba Intermission, 325 N 4th St, to permit the service/consumption of alcohol outside for one evening, Saturday, November 10, 2018.**

Kristi Nowitzky, Manager of Intermission, stated they were requesting permission for an outdoor bar in the back area, of approximately 16 x 30 feet, for Saturday evening. She commented the 11-11 Party at the Grand would be going on and they wanted to be part of it because it brings so many people downtown.

Nowitzky stated it would be a small 8' bar and there would most likely be no more than 25 people outside; everything will be plastic or cans, no glass. Two security guards have been hired for the evening to stand by the exit area. She indicated she spoke with the Fire Inspector and he approved their plan. There will not be any outside music; the entertainment is a two-piece acoustic act inside the bar.

Peckham questioned how it will be fenced or enclosed. Nowitzky stated there is currently a fence on the east side, the building itself, and a natural barrier with the security guards. She stated people would have to go through the bar to get to the outside bar.

Motion by Peckham, second by Kellbach to approve temporary outside service/consumption at Intermission, 3255 N 4<sup>th</sup> St, for the evening of Saturday, November 10, 2018. Motion carried 5-0.

Comments on Proposed Ordinance W.M.C. §8.08.013  
Keeping Miniature Pigs

- A resident has requested the City consider whether it would permit the keeping of miniature pigs. Currently the City prohibits the keeping of any type of pig, miniature or otherwise through W.M.C. §8.08.010 Certain creatures forbidden, which prohibits farm animals within the City limits.
- Under the proposed ordinance submitted for consideration, a miniature pig is defined as one that weighs no more than 200 pounds and does not exceed a height of 24 inches at the shoulder. A household on a residential zoning lot designated as R-1 or R-2 “Single Family Residence District,” or upon a lot designated as R-3 “Two Family Residence District” would be able to have not more than one miniature pig per dwelling unit. Miniature pigs would not be permitted in any other type of commercial or residential lot.
- No person would be able to keep a miniature pig within the City without first obtaining a license from the City. The license would need to be renewed annually. Upon approval, a tag would be issued to the owner, identical to a dog or cat license tag, and the miniature pig would be required to wear that tag, affixed to a collar at all times.
- The fee for the license is proposed to be the same as that for an urban chicken permit, \$35.00 per year. For comparison purposes, the license fee for a spayed/neutered dog or cat is \$18.00 per year and the fee for an unspayed or unneutered dog or cat is \$60.00. There is a license discount of \$8.00 for a dog or cat that is microchipped. A pet fancier permit is \$35.00 per year.
- With respect to the limitations on number of dogs and cats in W.M.C. §8.08.120, any dwelling unit which is already a home 2 dogs would be unable to have a miniature pig.
- As drafted, the ordinance proposes an inspection to ensure compliance with certain requirements of the ordinance, such size of pig and ability to keep a miniature pig in a manner so as not to disturb the peace a neighborhood.
- W.M.C. §8.08.010(b) as it currently exists, prevents any animal other than a domesticated dog or cat from being brought into a public park or place, including a playground or school ground. An amendment is proposed to allow miniature pigs to be brought into a park. However, W.M.C. §8.08.190 Animals not to run at large, subsection (c) would operate to prohibit miniature pigs from the 400 Block during organized special events, similar to the prohibition on other animals.
- Rabies vaccinations are not required for miniature pigs under state law. Apparently a veterinarian is able to use a rabies vaccination designed for a horse or dog, although it is unclear what the standard recommended practice of veterinarians is concerning rabies vaccinations for miniature pigs.
- Should the draft ordinance be recommended for approval, additional amendments to chapter 8 of the Code will be made to ensure that miniature pigs are incorporated into other provisions where appropriate.
- A brief survey of random communities indicates the following permit miniature pigs: Port Washington, Waukesha, and Green Bay. Stevens Point would allow a miniature pig upon the granting of a permit.

The following communities do not allow miniature pigs: Beloit, Fond du Lac, Osh Kosh and Janesville.

Issues to consider:

Should a miniature pig be permitted within City parks, similar to a dog or cat?

May individuals apply for a “Pet Fancier Permit” where a miniature pig would put the dwelling unit over the dog/cat pet limitation?

Should a miniature pig be required to be microchipped? The proposed ordinance does not impose that requirement but requires the miniature pig wear a license tag on a collar at all times.

Should any outside housing for a miniature pig be required to be at least 25 feet from any principal residential structure on an adjacent lot and at least 10 feet from the property line of the lot on which it is kept (see W.M.C. §8.08.125 Restriction on animals other than dogs and cats)?

Section 1. That Section 8.08.013 Keeping of Miniature Pigs, is hereby created to read as follows:

8.08.013 Keeping of Miniature Pigs.

(a) License Required. No person shall keep a miniature pig upon any premises in the city without obtaining a valid license issued by the city clerk.

(1) A license shall be valid for a period of one-year from January 1 through December 31, and shall be renewed annually.

(2) The license process requires submission of a completed application accompanied with a fee as provided in section 3.40.010(a). Each license application shall be accompanied by:

(A) Proof of registration with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection in accordance with Wis. Stat. §95.51;

(B) A written statement from a licensed veterinarian certifying that the miniature pig has been neutered and spayed.

(3) A late fee of two times the application fee along with the application fee as provided in section 3.40.010(a) shall be collected from every owner or keeper of a miniature pig if the owner or keeper fails to obtain a license prior to January 1 of each year, or fails to obtain a license prior to acquiring the miniature pig.

- (4) Prior to issuance of a license, the applicant shall submit to an inspection and demonstrate that all requirements of subsection (b) are met.
- (5) Upon compliance with this section and payment of the fee, the city clerk shall issue a license tag to the owner for the miniature pig licensed.
- (6) The holder of a valid license may keep a miniature pig in accordance with this section notwithstanding the prohibitions in section 8.08.010(a) of this Code.

(b) Standards. A license authorizes the keeping of a miniature pig on a premises provided the following requirements are met:

- (1) A miniature pig may only be kept at a residential zoning lot designated as R-1 or R-2 "Single Family Residence District," or upon a lot designated as R-3 "Two Family Residence District." No more than one (1) miniature pig is allowed to be kept in each dwelling unit located on such a lot.
- (2) No miniature pig may be kept or housed in any dwelling unit which has two or more dogs.
- (3) A miniature pig shall obtain any vaccinations required by state law.
- (4) A miniature pig may be kept as a pet only and shall not be bred, boarded, kept, used, or sold for any agricultural or commercial purposes.
- (5) No slaughter of a miniature pig shall occur on any premises or within the City.
- (6) Miniature pigs shall be kept in such a manner as not to disturb the peace of a neighborhood or passersby on a public right-of-way.
- (7) The license tag issued by the city clerk shall be affixed to a collar worn at all times by the miniature pig.
- (8) No miniature pig may weigh more than 200 pounds or may exceed a height of 24 inches at the shoulder.
- (9) The care and handling of miniature pigs shall comply with other provisions of chapter 8 of this Code concerning animals, including but not limited to §8.08.020, mistreating of animals and §8.08.120 providing proper food and drink.

(c) License revocation. A license shall be subject to revocation upon failure to comply with any provisions of this section. Once a license is revoked, a license shall not be reissued.

(d) Upon written request, the chief of police or the chief's designee may consider waiver of any requirement specified in this section on a case by case basis upon a

satisfactory showing that such requirement is not necessary for the protection and safety of the public, adjoining property owners, and the surrounding neighborhood in such case.

(e) Any miniature pig which is not inoculated against rabies and which bites a human being resulting in an injury which breaks the skin may be apprehended and impounded. In the absence of written proof provided immediately by the owner or caretaker to the humane officer or law enforcement official that the miniature pig has been inoculated against rabies and is current on such vaccination such animal will be euthanized and tested for rabies for the protection of the public health and safety and the individual who has been bitten.

Section 2. That Section 8.08.010 Certain creatures forbidden, is hereby amended to read as follows:

8.08.010 Certain creatures forbidden.

...

(b) No person shall possess in any public park or place, including any playground or school ground, any animal or creature other than a domesticated dog or cat or a miniature pig which is licensed in accordance with section 8.08.013. Any such domesticated dog, or cat or miniature pig in a public park or place shall be subject to all other applicable restrictions and requirements of this chapter.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its date of publication.



- (1) *Case #18-11770, 10/07/18 at 2:08 AM:* An Officer made a traffic stop of a vehicle at a location away from the bar. However, some of the occupants had been drinking at Jalapeno's. The driver was twenty-two years old, however the two passengers were both twenty years old. They admitted to having been drinking at Jalapeno's, and had not been carded. The Officers did not follow up at the bar to attempt to confirm that was where they had been.
- (2) *Case #18-12519, 10/28/18 at 8:02 AM:* A citizen reported having her purse stolen from the bar after she dropped it in the bathroom. She was not able to provide a suspect and was issued a voluntary theft report. At one point she thought she had located a suspect for the location of her phone, but it did not pan out.

The reporting person stated he had been inside the bar drinking, with two others that were asked to leave. They all left, and the offending woman followed them out and started a confrontation with him. She screamed at him and slapped him. He wished to pursue charges of battery against the woman. Officers located the woman in another, nearby establishment. She attempted to run from Officers and resisted their efforts to arrest her. One woman claimed that the male had followed her from the bar, insulting her family. He noted that she had been in the bar, arguing with her boyfriend most of the time. The bartender had never seen a backpack, and assumed the boyfriend would have had it. The bartender said the couple left the bar together. The backpack was not located at the time.

**Labor Temple, 318 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue**

- (1) *Event #180131824, 10/24/18 at 9:35 PM:* A **bar employee** called to request assistance because there was an intoxicated male there that was making everyone uncomfortable and staring at people. On arrival, a male tried to avoid Police contact by ignoring commands while he scurried around to the back of the bar.
